A Tribute to Cmdr. Oeser

ALPINE — A group of men who feel that they owe much to a man who lived and died in Alpine, have sent, through their secretary, Orville Palmer, a tribute to a man. That man is Cdr. Rudolph (Rudy) Oeser, and the group of men is the Board of Fire Commissioners in Alpine.

Cdr. Oeser died on the 29th of June. When he died, he left a void in the lives of many, and many remember the fine things that he did to help Alpine prosper.

Mr. Oeser became concerned about fire protection for Alpine as early as 1954. He became a member of the governing board of what was then known as the Alpine Fire Protection District. This group was brought into being through the foresight and civic concern of such long-time citizens of Alpine as Paul Black and Henry McKie. There were many others who participated, too numerous to list.

For the ensuing eight years, the Association worked untiringly for the improvement of Alpine's protection in case of fire.

Cdr. Oeser was in a great measure responsible for building a Volunteer Fire Force, headed by the then fire chief, Lee Roper. This force has grown into the reliable and efficient department that Alpine has today.

It was largely through his efforts that the fire district was reorganized in 1958 as the Alpine Local Fire District and it now operates under state fire regulations and is also under the authority and is a part of our local govern-

ment. Cdr. Oeser also lent his efforts to the building of the attractive and efficient fire headquarters that are seen on the north side of Hwy. 80. The present alarm system; the reciprocal agreements with the State Division of Forestry and the U.S. Forestry Service; the purchase of adequate insurance for the district's firemen and other employees; these things and many others, were influenced by Rudy Oeser.

It will also be remembered that while Cdr. Oeser was functioning as secretary and auditor, and chairman of the Board of Fire Commissioners, he instigated a long-term plan whereby a sum of \$2,000 annually was provided for the eventual acquisition of a modern fire truck with equipment for fighting structural fires. This plan was carried on by all subsequent governing boards and a modern, fully equipped fire apparatus, built by the American La France Corp. to the district's specifications will be delivered to Alpine near the end of this month.

Alpine is indebted to Cdr. Oeser for his splendid community spirit. The post office flew its flag at half-mast for this fine gentleman, a tribute not given to many. Alpine will miss Cdr. Oeser, and it is hoped that through his fine spirit and splendid contributions to this community, others will be inspired to follow his fine example.

Cdr. Rudy Oeser will long be remembered by the town he loved and served.

Pine Valley Resident Graduates

SAN DIEGO — A two day radiological meter operators course was completed by 13 San Diego county residents this week, William B. Marty county administrative officer for civil defense said today.

The list of graduates included Robert W. Pharr, 301 Valley View Tr., Pine Valley, who is employed by the San Diego Gas and Electric Company.

The monthly course is presented at the County Civil Defense Center. Instruction includes discussions of nuclear weapon phenomenology, radioactive fallout, protection from the effects of fallout, how radiation affects living tissue and how radiation can be measured by instruments. Members of the class participate in an outdoor drill in the actual detection of sources of radiation.

Each graduate is qualified for assignment to one of the Unified San Diego County Civil Defense Organization's 191 radiological monitoring stations, Marty said.

More than 1,400 persons have been trained in the county, he said.

Copter Piloted to Safety

SAN DIEGO — "Drop the Gear," a phrase regularly used in Naval Aviation, was taken somewhat literally last week at Ream Field.

The Navy has released this exclusive report to the Town and Country News concerning seven twin jet turbine SH-3A helicopters flown by Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron (HS-6) of which Lt. Cmdr. Norman L. Haney is a part.

The helicopters had assembled on the duty runway in preparation for a flight to the USS Hornet (CVS-12) which was operating off-shore to conduct carrier qualification landings.

Upon take-off, the tail wheel assembly of one of the aircraft was noticed to fall to the runway. With an immediate landing made impractical, the plane began to orbit the field with a crew which included Lt. Cmdr. Norman L. Haney.

Below, wheels began to turn swiftly as communication was passed between aircraft and control tower, Base Operations and Squadron. With Cmdr. John St. Marie taking

charge of operations on the ground, mattresses from the station barracks were assembled to form a cushion over which the crippled aircraft could land.

With Billy L. Clanton in position to direct the pilot position, Lt. Cmdr. Haney slowly brought the helicopter into position and gently lowered the tail onto the prepared cushion. This smooth landing brought to an end one hour of flight time.

Lt. Cmdr. Haney is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clark Haney, Chevron dealers in Alpine. The Lt. Cmdr. resides in El Cajon with his wife "Chick" and their seven children.

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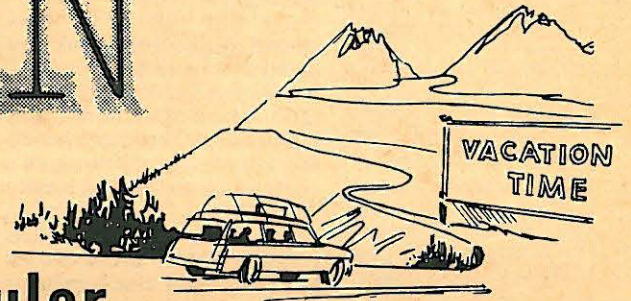
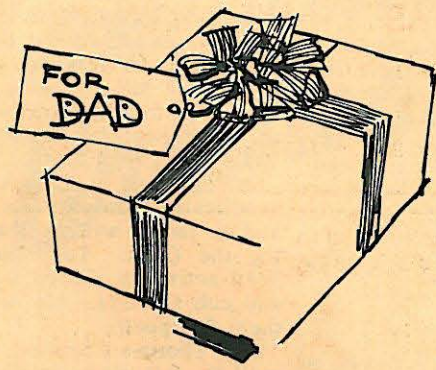

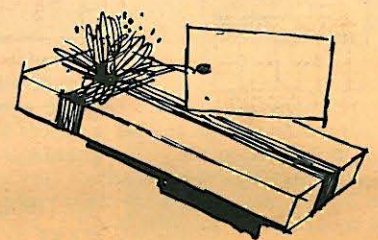

The Bible's place in the modern home and how to use it as a family will be some of the fine instruction that will be given to help keep the Christian family united.

"What's more, just as there is no admission charge to enter one's family circle, so there is no admission charge to the 24 thousand congregational meetings of Jehovah's Christian Witnesses around the world," Walterhouse concluded.

SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM BRINGS LARGE ENROLLMENT

ALPINE — Approximately 207 students have enrolled in the 1965 Alpine Summer School Program. According to Mark Kerby, Summer School director, this is the largest enrollment ever. More are expected to enroll before the June 18 deadline, as this should be a most exciting and educational program.

The central theme of the Summer School Program will be "Communication and Sound." The history of communication and music will be traced from the very primitive era right up to the present time. The children will be exposed to many different communication media, such as radio, TV, telegraph, newspaper, telephone and written and oral communications. Besides this, they will have an opportunity to experiment with very primitive methods as well as the opportunity to experiment and construct models of some of the modern equipment in communications.

The Pacific Telephone Company is working with the program and is going to furnish telephone equipment, materials and resource speakers. Every Friday, beginning July 9, the telephone Company will send a speaker to talk to other students and put on special demonstrations. The parents of the students will be invited to participate.

The Philippines and England is also on the schedule and the telephone Company will place a call to Manila and possibly London and give the children an opportunity to talk to these countries.

In addition to this most unusual program there will be offered a specialized program in math, reading and language during the summer.

Mr. San Nicolas spent 21 years in the U.S. Navy as a chef. He and his family are from the island of Guam and have been in the States since 1956.

She will remain in Grossmont Hospital for about two more weeks, receiving treatment after three anti-venom shots failed to alleviate the condition.

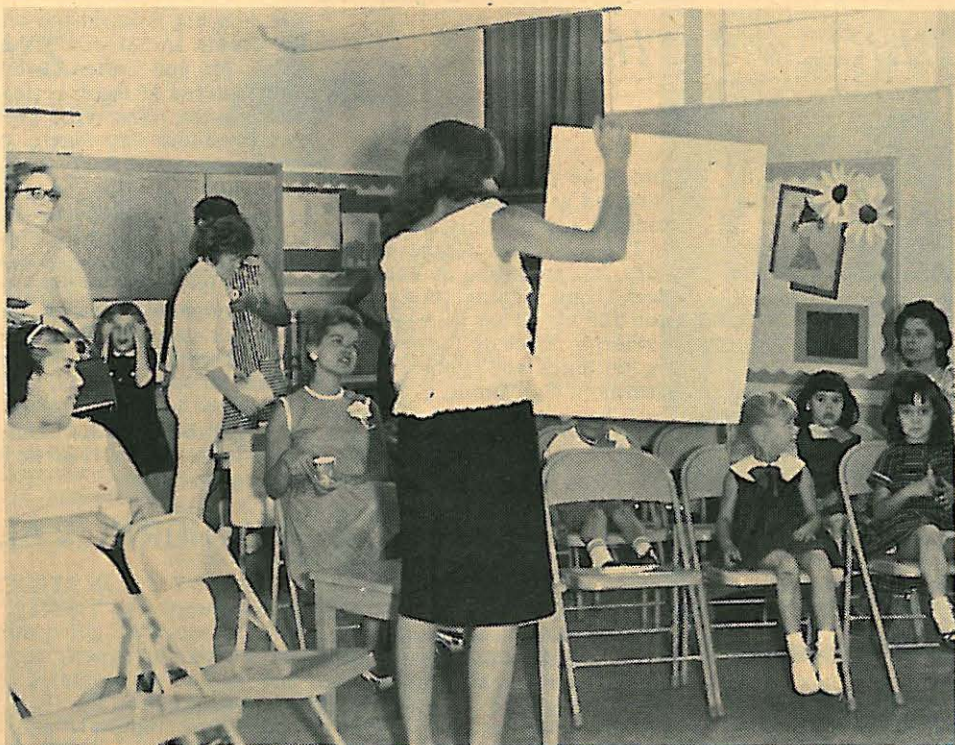
Mrs. Willson reported that she stepped off the porch of her home and was immediately bitten by a young snake that gave no warning before striking.

DILL POTATO SALAD

Spring and summer are salad seasons. Potato salad comes in many versions and styles but this one combines the simplicity of a well seasoned oil and vinegar dressing with an extra filip from the dill. Use fresh dill weed if your garden affords it, or dry from your spice shelf. The warm potatoes absorb the flavors and the crisp Western iceberg lettuce supply the added greens.

Pour water over soup mix in bowl. Let stand while preparing other ingredients. Cook potatoes in boiling water until tender. Combine corn oil, vinegar, corn syrup, tarragon, dill, celery seed, salt, pepper and soup mixture. Pare and slice potatoes into large bowl while still warm. Shake dressing well to blend, then pour over warm potatoes. Toss lightly. Chill at least three hours, overnight if possible. Serve on lettuce. Makes 10 servings.

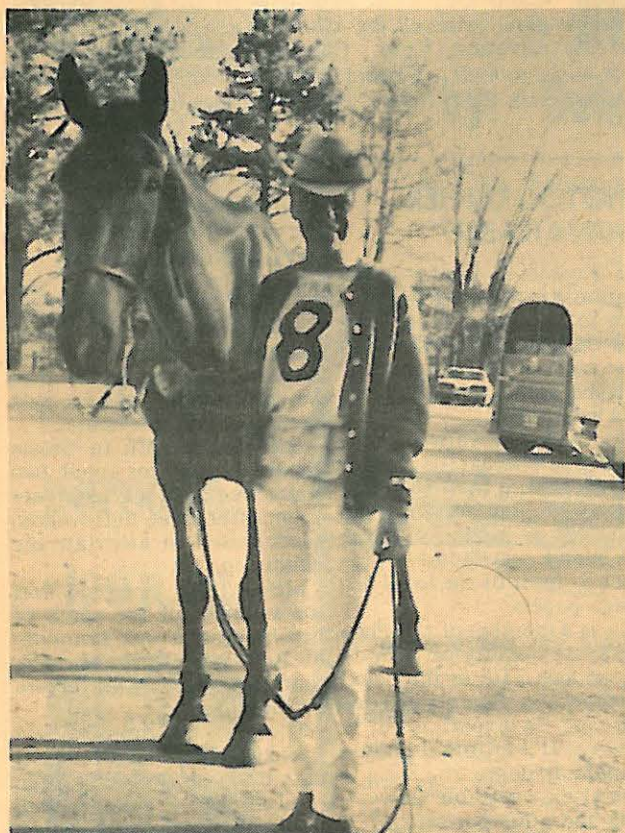
