Alpine Chosen for Charger Photos

ALPINE — Thursday after-noon, residents of this area were startled to see a rather unique airplane flying over the western section of Alpine. The plane flew directly at the hills across Highway 80 and would seem almost to disap-

After some inquiry, Ray Blair, assistant to the president at General Dynamics Convair, San Diego, called the Town and Country News to tell them that the "Charger" was in the area.

Alpine had been chosen for photographs because of resemblance to the kind of area in which the "Charger" was designed to perform.

The "Charger" was designed, built, and is now being flight tested by Convair. It utilizes what is known as deflected slipstream to achieve remarkably short take offs and landings in less than 500 feet.

It is powered by 650 horsepower turbo propengines, driving two nine-foot propellers. Extra large flaps, extending the entire length of the wing trailing edge, are bathed in the slipstream to provide maximum lift for take off and landing.

The "Charger" is the first airplane developed specifically to perform a tactical role in direct support of combat troops in the forward battle area. It will bridge the gap between the helicopter and the high-performance jet.

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


