

#### Trailer Driving Requires Review

SACRAMENTO - "If your summer plans include towing a trailer, it's a good idea to review your driving habits as well, " California Highway Patrol Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden said.

"The maximum speed for any vehicle which tows a trailer is 50 mph — subject of course to lower posted limits. Because the weight of the two vehicles is greater, following distances should be increased well beyond the usual one car length per each 10 miles of speed to allow adequate space for safe stops.

"Vehicles pulling trailers are required to drive in the right-hand lane, except when passing because of increased

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#### Writer Wins Award

For the second year, a California newspaper science writer has been awarded a \$500 Christmas Seal Fellowship for study in a nationally renowned medical research labatory.

Local contributions are helping to send William B. Boquist, San Francisco Examiner, to Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston, for two weeks of research in the hospital's pulmonary laboratory, Leon F. Ryan, Alpine area chairman of the Tuberculosis and Health Association of San Diego County, announced.

Boquist will work with Dr. Robert H. Ebert, dean of the Harvard University medical school and Dr. Frank Austen, who are investigating emphysema.

Aimed at giving science writers first-hand knowledge of scientific techniques, the fellowship is awarded by the National Tuberculosis Assn. in cooperation with the National Association of Science Writers and the Council for the Advancement of Science Writing. A special committee of the Council selected Boquist for the award.

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#### Fire District Improvements Shown

ALPINE — During the past two years, the Alpine Fire District has up-graded the Fire Department in many ways. So that all may know about the accomplishments, we list them here.

1. Two-way radios have been installed in fire trucks and base station has been installed at the fire house.

2. Electric hose reels and directional signals have been installed on all fire trucks.

3. Two thousand feet of two and one-half fire hose and one thousand feet of one and one-half hose has been ac-

quired.
4. Three fire hydrants are installed in the business area of the community and an agreement has been arranged with the Rio San Diego Water District for use of the water system's blow-offs throughout the fire district.

5. Rotary two-phone telephone unit has been installed at the fire station.

6. A training schedule has been approved by the Pacific Fire Rating Bureau established for volunteer firemen. 7. A new, 750-gallon per

type fire truck has been secured. 8. A complete set of rules

to meet all requirements of six radio alarm units for firethe Pacific Rating Bureau for men. a most favorable rating. 9. One fire truck has been

converted to a hose lay truck with a capacity of 4,800 feet.

10. New Purple K and ABC insurance rates to individuals.

11. New PA and siren and yipper alerting system has been acquired for the International truck.

12. Two Uniflow nozzles with 85 gallon per minute capacity, and one with 200 gallon per minute capacity has been purchased.

13. Thirty Five potential portable fire plugs have been marked in the district.

14. A fund has been appropriated for the construction of a firemen's block house to be used in firemen's

training program.
15. A new flood light has been purchased for use at night fires.

16. A plan has been formulated providing purchase and installation of fire hydrants throughout improved areas of the Fire District without assessment, bond issue, or raising of tax rate. (Installation of such hydrants can start as soon as the District Board can come to an agreement with Rio San Diego Water District providing for installation and maintenance of minute Nation Board of Un- such hydrants. 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




