



Wreck Injures Five State Beach Opens Saturday

ALPINE— Highway 80, west of town, was the scene of a collision between a car and three motorcycles Friday at about 11:30.

The California Highway Patrol was on the scene as was the Alpine Volunteer Fire Department. Steve Stephan, Country Deputy for Alpine, was the first officer to arrive at the accident.

Apparently attempting a left turn, a car was stopped crosswise in the westbound lane of U.S. 80 and the motorcycles were westbound on 80 also.

The blaze started by the impact of the motorcycles and cars, was brought under control by the Alpine Fire Department and the State Division of Forestry.

At press time, one of the men was listed as critical and the other four involved in the accident were listed as fair. All were residents of other areas.

LA JOLLA — Assemblyman Hale Ashcraft, (80th Dist.) has announced that a new \$900,000 public campground at the South Carlsbad unit of the San Diego Coast State Beaches will open for use at 8 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 21.

The campground is three miles south of Carlsbad on Coast Highway 101 and was known as the La Costa unit.

Ashcraft said, "The opening of this facility will mark the return of coastal camping to San Diego County after an eight-month closure during the construction period. Although the old La Costa unit offered only makeshift facilities, it was an extremely popular spot for coastal camping."

The Assemblyman noted that the project was funded

and constructed by State Division of Beaches and Parks and will have a parking space, table, wood stove and food cupboard. Modern sanitary facilities and hot showers will be available in ten buildings located throughout the campground. The area is fenced from the highway and has been extensively landscaped.

Conveniently located stairways along the bluff will provide access to two miles of State Beach overlooked by nine lifeguard towers.

The lawmaker, who has worked with Beaches and Parks Officials on this project, indicated that a concession building where basic food items and other needs will be available in scheduled for opening at the campground in September.

Commissioners Discuss Hydrants Placement

ALPINE — The most important business considered by the Alpine Fire Commissioners Tuesday, was the method by which they will contract to purchase, install and maintain the fire hydrants which will be purchased.

The unanimous feeling was that the commissioners would like to expedite by the best means possible, the installation of the hydrants.

Approximately 24 fire hydrants will be placed in Alpine. They will be installed at the most strategic places to afford the maximum protection for the largest number of people.

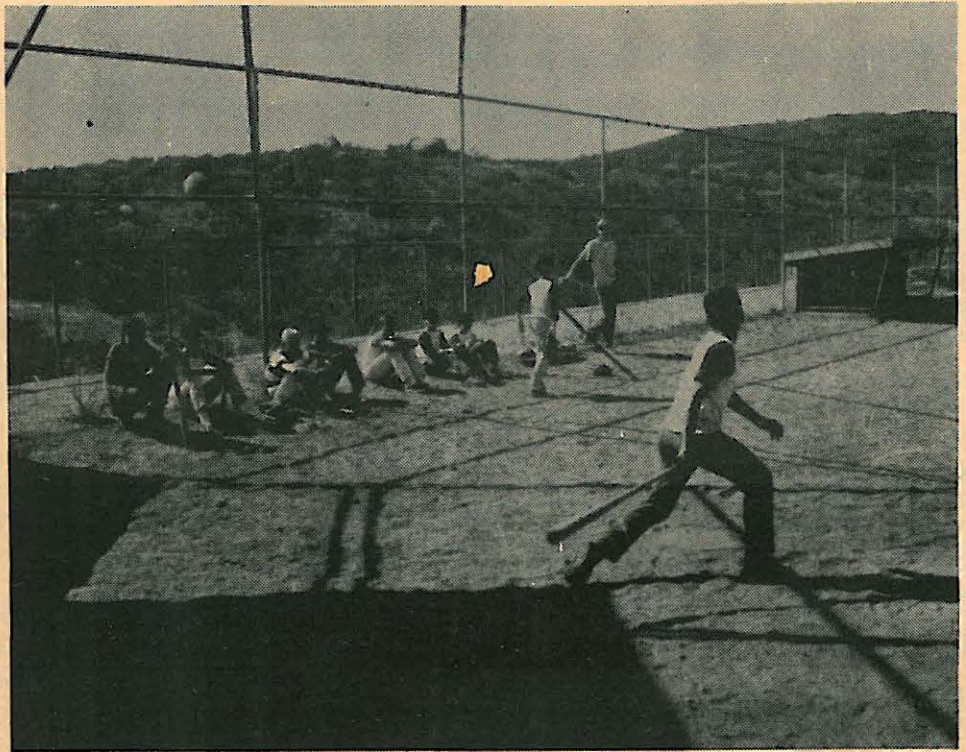
Four uniformed drills on a single weekend starting Sept. 25, make this training attractive to officers who must travel some distance to participate.

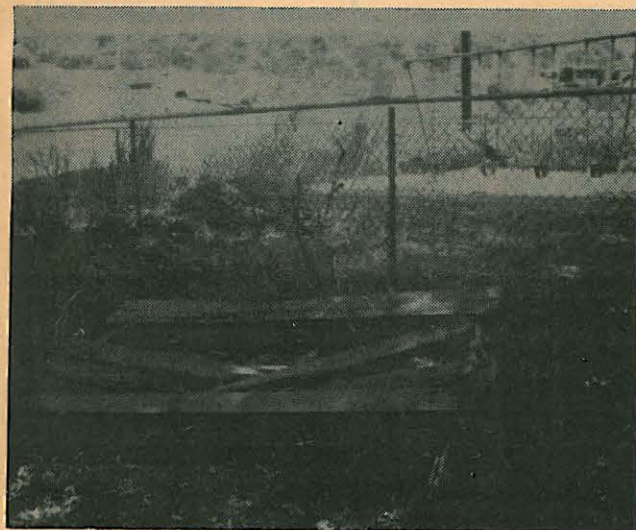

Trailer Driving Warning Given on Burning Permits Requires Review

SACRAMENTO — "If your summer plans include towing a trailer, it's a good idea to review your driving habits as well," California Highway Patrol Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden said.

"The maximum speed for any vehicle which tows a trailer is 50 mph — subject of course to lower posted limits. Because the weight of the two vehicles is greater, following distances should be increased well beyond the usual one car length per each 10 miles of speed to allow adequate space for safe stops.

"Vehicles pulling trailers are required to drive in the right-hand lane, except when passing or preparing for a left turn. Remember that more clearance is necessary when passing because of increased length.

"Trailer sway can be reduced by using a proper hitch and by suitable weight distribution in both car and trailer. The hitch should be securely mounted — preferably to the frame — and must be strong enough for the weight drawn. It must be supplemented by a safety chain between vehicles.

"If the trailer or its load obscures your view to the rear, two side mirrors are required on the towing vehicle to provide a clear view at least 200 feet to the rear.

"In mountain driving on two-lane roads, slower moving vehicles are required to pull into marked turnouts whenever five or more vehicles are lined up behind."

Warning Given on Burning Permits

ALPINE — All residents are reminded that incinerator burning permits expired on June 1, 1965, and should be renewed by making a written application at the fire station. In applying for a permit the applicant should give name and street address also.

Since we are at the height of the hazardous season, all residents should be aware of the laws concerning incinerator burning.

The fire marshal for this district, inspects for all permit burning on Thursday of each week and when an appli-

cant's premises are examined and found safe for burning, he will issue a permit valid through May 31, 1966.

Those persons formerly issued incinerator burning permits upon having premises examined, apparently are of the opinion that their permit is currently valid but such is not the case. Therefore, anyone doing incinerator burning without a permit issued since June 1, 1965, will be burning in violation of the district regulations.

To my lips its wonder brought a cry.

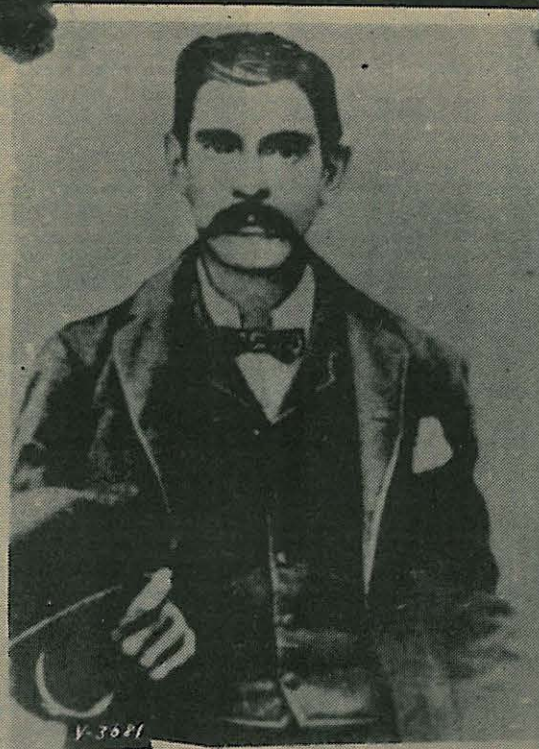
How could this be?

Editorial

(Editor's Note: We are pleased to present a guest editorial from Rev. William Bray, pastor of the First Baptist Church of the Willows.)

The community of Alpine urgently needs a responsible committee composed of truly interested persons that will now give serious attention to park and year 'round recreation needs for the residents of this community and surrounding area. With the close of a "summer schedule of baseball for boys" very near at hand, some much needed thought should be given to how Otto Field and a much neglected recreational facility on the Youth Center and community park could be better put to use.

Early in the spring of 1965, consideration was given to the matter of resuming baseball for younger boys of the Alpine areas as a "summer recreational" opportunity during June through August. This program was undertaken June 5, 1965 at Otto Field, in Alpine. The cry to "play ball" and the call "batter up" were words that signaled the start of six exciting innings of summer baseball for over 50 boys in Alpine and Descanso scheduled for Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays through June and the early part of July, and then changed to just Tuesdays and Saturdays during the latter part of August. There are four teams this year playing baseball.

Otto Field, in Alpine, and the ball diamond at the Descanso School were the two fields selected. Otto Field, a fine playing field, in the past echoed of fine accomplishments and thrilling, and not so thrilling, ball games. But for nearly one and one-half years, a baseball program for younger boys in the Alpine area was a forgotten matter. The diamond was virtually left untouched and in need of being placed or put in better condition as a ball field so that future games could be played there. Tell tale marks of vandalism can still be seen by those who proceeded to deface and destroy personal property belonging to the Youth Center.

When this summer baseball program was undertaken by a relatively few concerned persons, those guiding the program found individuals related to the Alpine Chamber of Commerce very interested in the resumption of baseball for the younger boys, and because of their efforts financially and otherwise, the baseball program as a "summer recreational activity" for this year will end in a successful manner. For instance, Otto Field, which was never graded for proper drainage from the time it was laid out, now after a very successful horse show sponsored by the Alpine Chamber, has now proper drainage and is now a much better field to play on since a few individuals in the Chamber labored hard to keep an agreement with those guiding the baseball program.

Men related to the Chamber financially helped to obtain for the boys, much needed equipment, caps and shirts, so that these boys could better enjoy playing baseball this year. To those individuals in the Chamber who have made this year's baseball program as eventful as it has so far been, goes the much deserved thanks and gratitude of every ball player, coach and guiding sponsor. We thank you gentlemen, very much for your interest, cooperation and help. What you have done has been deeply appreciated.

To resume something that has been set aside is a difficult matter. It has not been an easy thing to promote and maintain a summer baseball recreational program but since it was done it now becomes a necessary factor to continue. Baseball and other sports that are enjoyed by boys and girls in this community that are of a wholesome nature need to be part of a planned program of community life. The question is "Who will assume this responsibility?" Will some concerned individuals assume this? Will an existing civic group in Alpine assume it? Or will it be just one person that will assume the responsibility? Summer baseball will soon be over — will it resume next year?

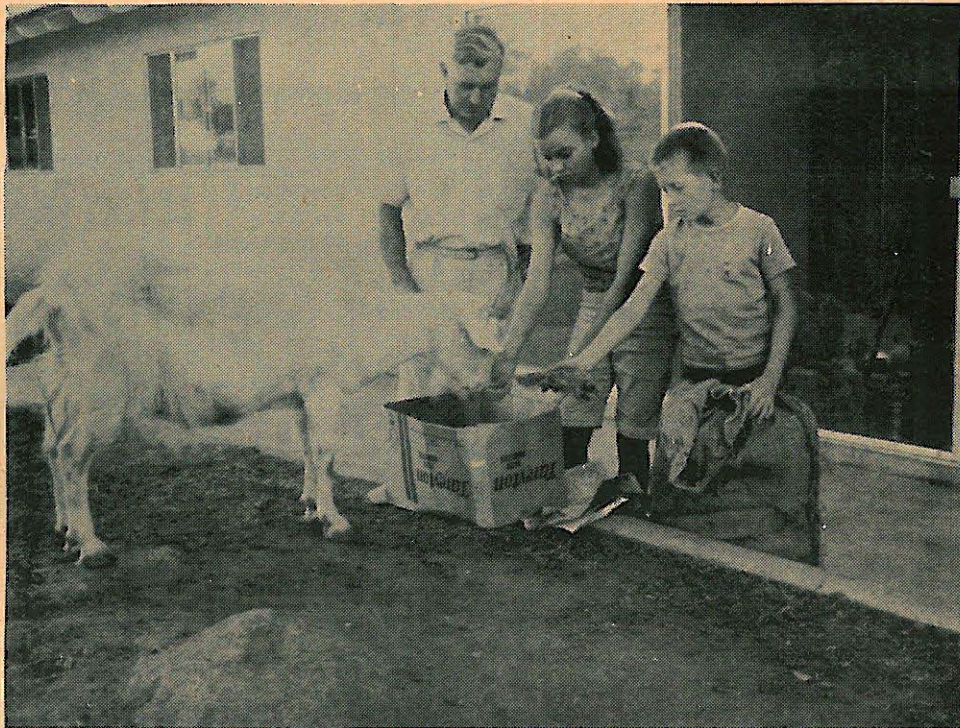

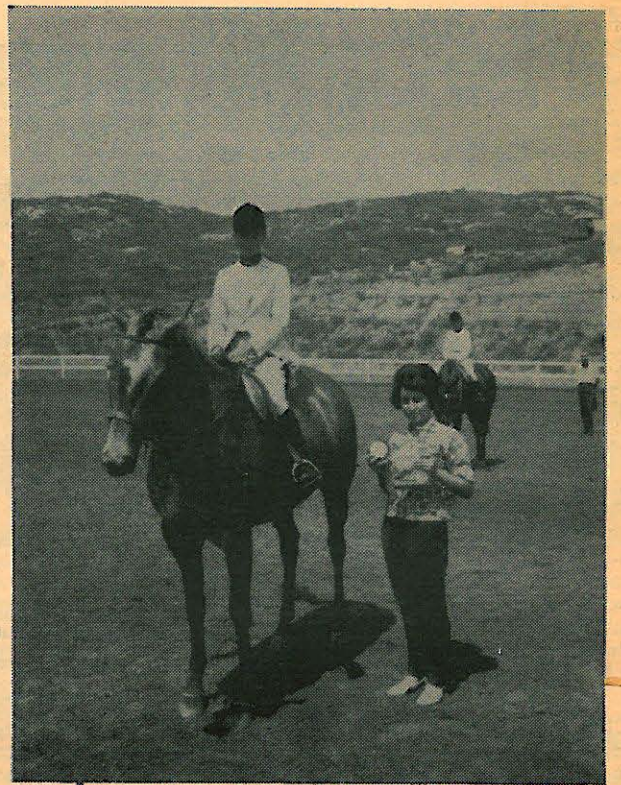

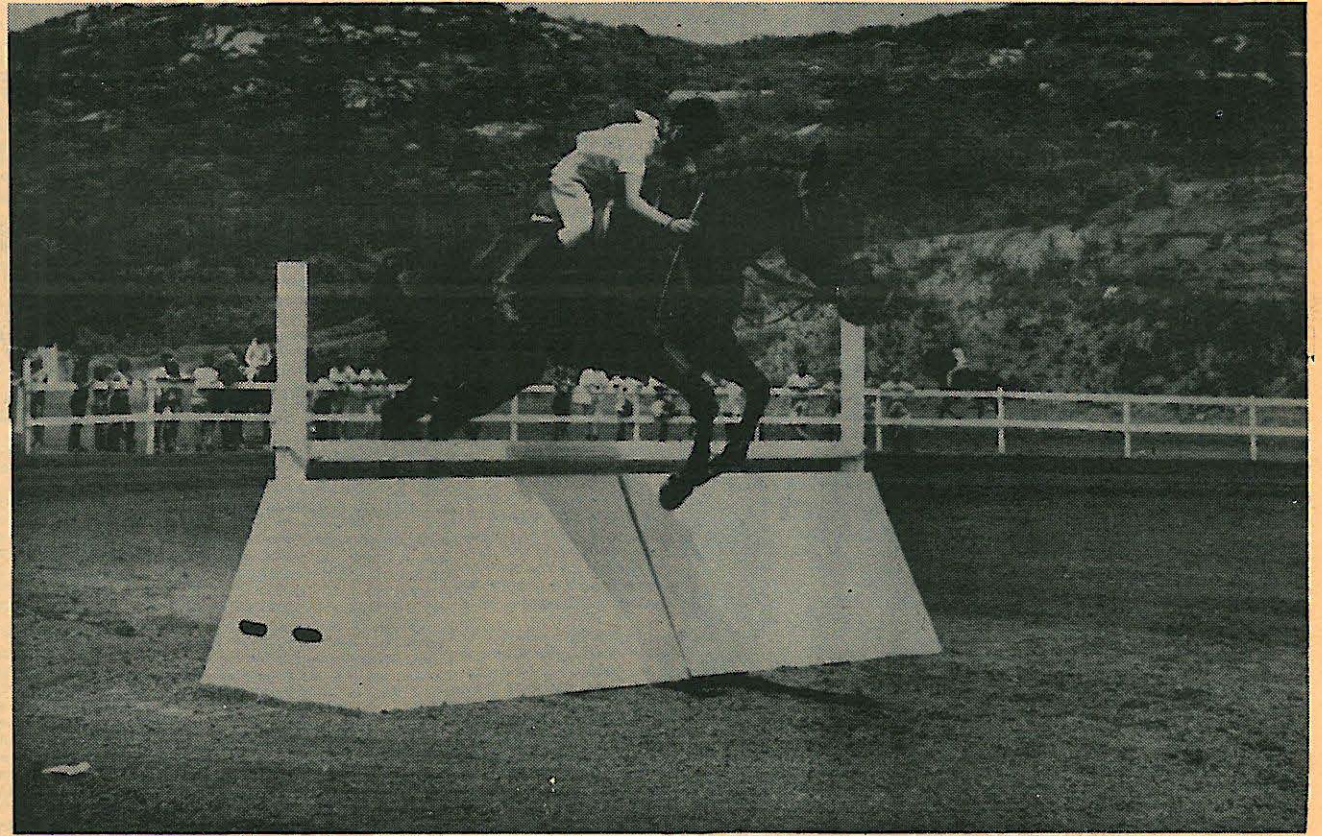
ALPINE LUTHERAN CHURCH
