

Owners Oppose Ordinance

SAN DIEGO - A great deal of misunderstanding has arisen over a proposed zoning ordinance amendment regarding stables, according to informed sources at the Board of Supervisors office.

There are no serious proponents of this amendment at present and adoption of the amendment as it is now writ-

Persons interested in this zoning ordinance should appear at the hearing which will as follows: be held before the Board of Supervisors on Tuesday, Sept. 21, at 2 p.m. in Room 310, San Diego County Administration Center, 1600 Pacific Highway.

The proposal to amend the ordinance reads, in part, as follows:

A. Amend Article II (Definitions) to add a new Section

106.9 to read as follows: Section 106.9 STABLE, BREEDING. "BREEDING

STABLE" means any premises, eight acres or more in area, whether or not improved, upon which horses owned by the occupants of said premises are bred, raised or trained, and upon which premises there are no horse shows or auctions, no riding horses for hire, no riding school, and no boarding or training horses of ten is unlikely, it was stated, other persons.

B. Amend Section 107 of

Article II (Definitions) to read

Section 107. STABLE, PRIV-"PRIVATE STABLE" means any premises, whether or not improved, upon which horses owned by the occupants of said premises are kept for their private use and enjoyment which horses are not kept for the purpose of sale or hire, or for training, show or breeding for remuneration.
