Motorcycle Races In Alpine Yes or No

VARIANCE HEARING SET

The Planning Commission of San Diego County will hear the pros and cons on a request for a zoning variance to legally establish the expanded track for future motorcycle races in Alpine.

Friday August 27, Harold Lutz filed with the County Planning Dept. a request for a variance to legalize the already expanded race track he operates, to facilitate motorcycles.

The hearing for all interested parties on the request for a variance will be at 10:30 a.m., room 310, Civic Center, 1600 Pacific Highway, Friday, September 10.

The activity at the Speedway last Saturday evening was legal, according to the County Counsel. The expanded track was not used and the change from micro cars to motorcycles is not in violation of the zoning ordinance, in their opinion.

This hearing gives an opportunity for people opposed to this race track to act by appearing in person and stating their opinions or having letters read into the testimony. The proponents of this race track may appeal to the County Board of Supervisors if the variance is refused, at this hearing.

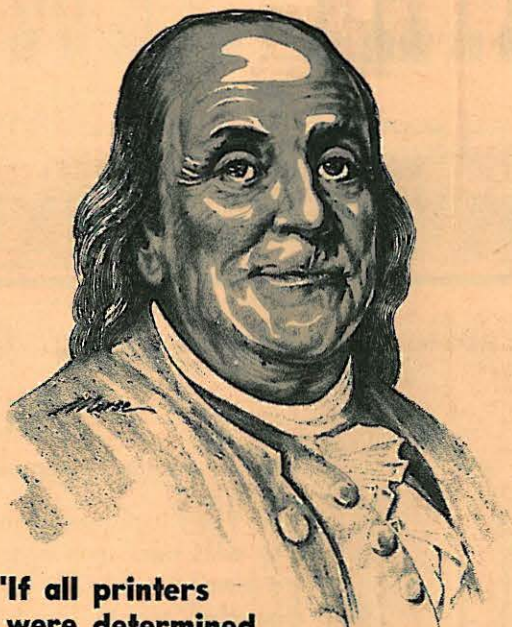

Some are criticizing our Supervisor, who has taken firm steps to see to the enforcement of the ZONING LAWS which were enacted to protect the people of this community. This is zoned as an Agricultural area and as such does not include such items as Raceways, etc., which produce a great deal of noise, dust and people wearing dirty, filthy clothes and leather jackets with gang names on their backs.

The Town and Country News is opposed to the holding of motorcycle races in Alpine — whether they be held for one week, one month, or forever.

It has cost us much to take this stand. It has cost friends, it has cost subscriptions, and it has cost advertisers.

Nevertheless, we must say what we believe. And we will "defend to the death" the right of others to disagree with us on this matter.

When the issue is taken to the Planning Commission, everyone having an opinion must be there to state that opinion. If those who are opposed, do not come to say that they are opposed, then they have no right to be upset if the decision goes against them. And the same is true concerning the group who would wish to carry on this particular entertainment in Alpine.

Whatever the decision, it is up to those who are concerned and who live within the affected area, to stand up and be counted.

Following are the two letters sent from the Building Inspection Dept. and the Violations Investigator.

Harold Lutz, recipient of the letters, denied receiving them and they are presented in the public interest.

Dear Sir:

Section 508 of the San Diego County Zoning Ordinance 1402 (New Series) states that a non-conforming use of land or of a building shall not be expanded or extended in any manner. On April 16, 1963, the effective date of zoning in Alpine, your racing activity consisted of micro-midget races conducted entirely within the enclosed oval near your concession buildings. According to the zoning ordinance, this is the lawful limits of your non-conforming use.

Since that time, openings have been made in the fence and it is reported that you are using the road to the northeast as an extension of your track which is now used for motorcycle racing; this constitutes an expansion in violation of said Section 508. The Building Inspection Department has asked the County Counsel for an opinion as to whether changing from micro-midgets to motorcycles is also an expansion of your non-conforming use. This opinion has not yet been given. However, until this opinion is received, we will expect you to confine your racing activity to the original oval and discontinue said expansion as to area of your non-conforming use, so as to comply with the zoning ordinance.

Section 700 of the San Diego County Zoning Ordinance does provide that when practical difficulties, unnecessary hardship or results inconsistent with the general purposes of this ordinance result through the strict literal interpretation of the provisions of this ordinance, a variance may be granted to allow a variance and expansion, ex-

tension or relocation of non-conforming uses. We would suggest that you make application at the office of the Planning Department, Room 207 in the San Diego County Administration Center for such a permit as the only course under which your track may be permitted to continue to operate.

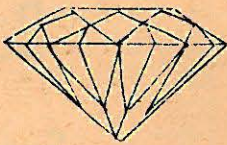
