

The County Planning Commission turned Lutz down on a variance and also on a permit to allow him to use the enlarged track, just two weeks

A great deal of controversy has arisen concerning the use of the enlarged track, as area residents have complained about the noise, the dust and the attraction to other motorcyclists to this area.

Both sides appeared before the Planning Commission at the hearing on the 10th to state their opinions concerning the use of the track.
