### CHRISTMAS SEAL REMINDERS DUE

ALPINE — About 80,000 final reminders for the 59th annual Christmas Seal campaign will be mailed this week, Leo F. Ryan, Alpine chairman of the Tuberculosis & Health Assn. of San Diego County, reported.

According to Ryan, the campaign receipts now stand at \$144,000.05, about \$4,600 ahead of last year at this time.

As an example, when a letter is addressed to Box 702, it is possible it will land in P.O.

Box 702. It should have been addressed Rt. 1 Box 702. If you receive mail by route carrier, be sure and use Rt. 1 in your address. Patrons who have mail addressed to street numbers slow down the delivery as street numbers are not recognized as mailing addresses.

### Awards to be Given

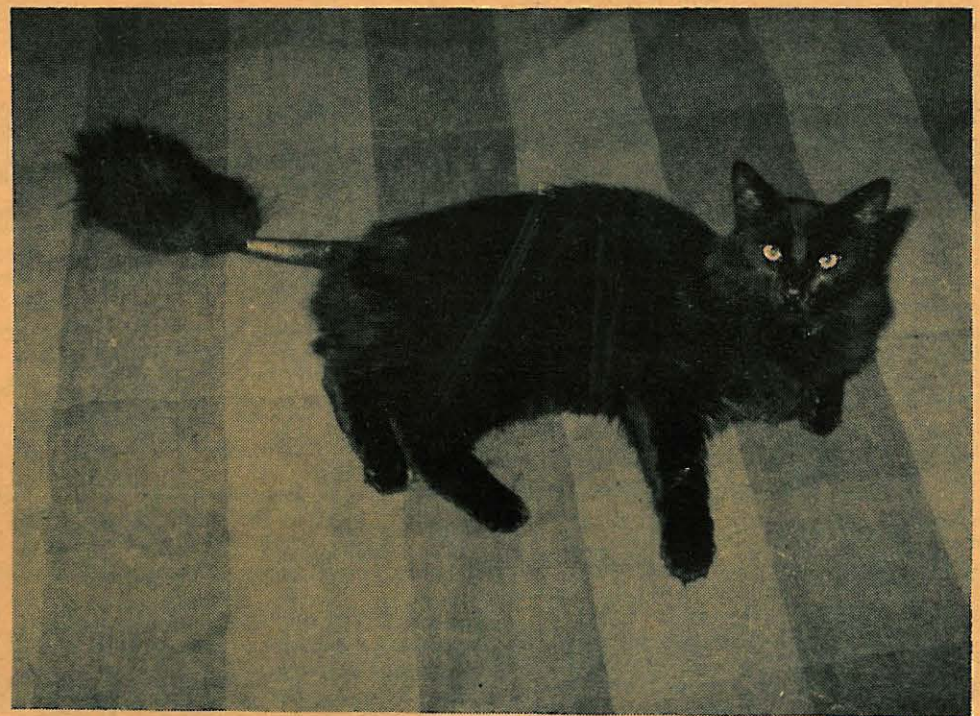

(Editor's Note: The day I arrived home from the hospital following my recent illness, the following letter was waiting for me. It is my hope that it will inspire our readers as much as it inspired all of us at the Town and Country News.)

Happy New Year to the Town and Country News.

My message for the year is "Count your blessings and smile."

On New Year's morning I had to dig a while before I could find any to count. But they were there and I found them.

I started 1966 a widow, having lost my husband last May.

Those of you who have suffered such a loss will understand that the better half of you is buried with your husband. You will also recall that almost everything will go wrong or fall apart. I did, but keep your chin up. There's a climax to everything.

The roof will start leaking, the clothesline will sag, the yard fence will fall apart, in fact everything will happen to test your courage. All these things happened to me with compound interest and the climax also. I fell and broke my arm.

I really hit bottom. I told myself, "This is the absolute end, I've had it!"

After three days of looking at that cast on my arm and thinking of all the things I couldn't do, I could have filled a blanket with tears and did. Then I had a heart to heart talk with my Maker. In a short while this thought came to me, "You are not licked until you give up."

I suddenly found the necessary courage to put on my fighting clothes and fight back. I said, "By the Grace of God, I will make 1966 a good year." I will too.

I looked at that cast and got out my pen and wrote these words on it, "I hate this thing with a passion." When I look at those words I draw courage to keep trying. My first blessing to count, "Thank God it is my left arm and I'm right handed."

One can do many things with one good hand but many things require one and at least a fraction of the second.

I looked at my left hand with the fingers swollen the size of two and the thumb the size of three. I decided that cast was too tight on my thumb so I got the bread knife, a pocket knife and the scissors and started operation number one. I whittled and sawed and pared till I got the bind off my thumb. I knew those fingers and my thumb needed exercise or they'd get stiff and perhaps useless so I went to the piano. I'm no Liberace at my best, but you'd be surprised how you can pick out a left hand harmony using one finger at a time. It worked, the swelling started to go down.

"Thank God for ingenuity."

Three days later I went to the basement

and did the laundry, using two fingers to guide the clothes through the wringer.

When I need to carve food and find my fingers won't stand the strain I just wash my elbow and set the old elbow down on it and I find the weight of the cast quite an advantage in holding it down while I carve with my right hand. So, "Thank God for a good elbow and even a little thanks for the weight of the cast."

Then I looked at myself in the mirror. My hair was a mess. This was another bridge to cross. How could I wash and put up my hair with one hand! Again I looked at that blasted cast that was holding me a prisoner and said, "I'll do it if it kills me," and brother, I did.

"Thank God for a bit of pride and human dignity."

Then the plumbing under the kitchen sink decided to fall apart. Water pouring everywhere. But my daughter walked in and turned the hot water off and cleaned up the mess.

"Thank God for a daughter with two good hands." At this I actually laughed. After all, what more could happen that hadn't already happened.

"Smile and the world smiles with you, weep and you weep alone."

I'm going to look up in the year 1966. There is a star up there somewhere with my name on it and I'm sure there will be a generous portion of star dust sift down on me as the New Year wears on.

Whatever happens to you, just remember "You are not licked till you give up."

Please find enclosed my check for another year's subscription to Town and Country News. I do a lot of reading and enjoy it. May the Lord smile down on all of you in 1966.

Dear Sir:

Last month two events placed a sharp focus on the problem of tuberculosis.

First, 10 active cases of TB were discovered aboard the USS Wasp, a Gemini space-craft recovery ship. Since the health of servicemen is zealously guarded, this helps indicate how tricky and deceptive tuberculosis really is.

Second, the San Diego County Department of Health announced that, for the third year in a row, there has been a gain in tuberculosis cases in the county.

Tuberculosis is a problem, no doubt about it! Some 610,000 Americans need attention because of it; 110,000 are known to have it; 250,000 have tuberculosis in inactive form that may become active; and 250,000 have had contact with active cases and may break down with the disease.

In addition, about 25.5 million of us

For the visit of Father Dollen of The Crest — a visit that meant much to me;

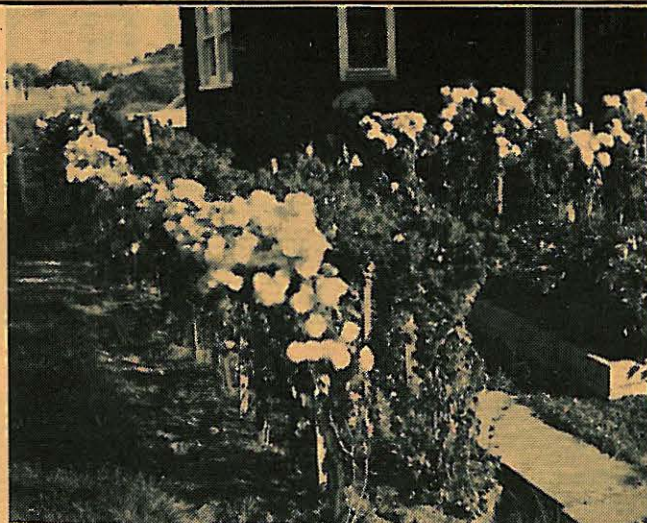
For the many many phone calls — some from people that I scarcely knew;

For the calls from as far away as San Jose, from concerned friends;

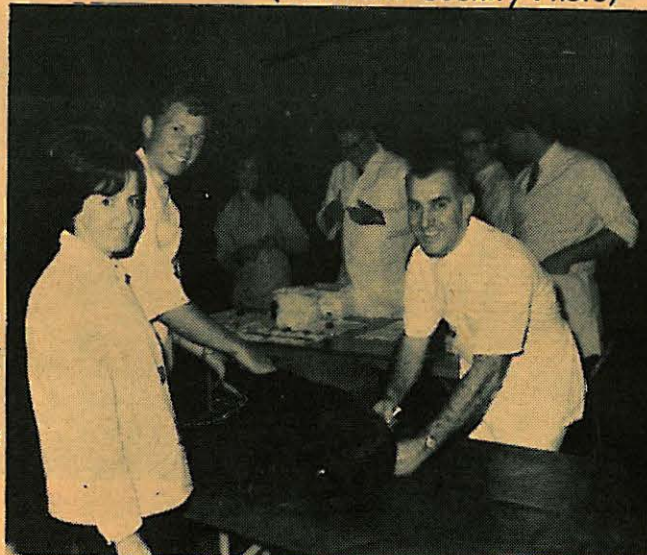
For the very special and very beautiful planter from two very special people;

MOST OF THE time I do not worry a bit about not belonging to exclusive clubs and prominent organizations — I have never been a joiner by nature, and the only thing I ever really was a member of officially for any length of time, was the P.T.A. But I received an unexpected letter from a cousin of mine in Michigan which opened up a whole new world for me. The letter said casually, as an afterthought in a postscript that I was, if I desired to take advantage of the opportunity, eligible for membership in that elite and exclusive group, the Daughters of the American Revolution, more commonly known as the D. A. R.

A MEMBERSHIP OF this kind, it seemed to me, was definitely by way of being a status symbol, and I got rather carried away. I could hardly wait for the arrival of a promised copy of my distinguished family tree — people seemed so interested, and every day when I went to work some of my associates would ask if I'd heard any more about my illustrious ancestors. I conveyed the distinct impression that there was a possibility of tracing our line back to Washington, or Adams, or Monroe, and I got to believing my own imaginings.

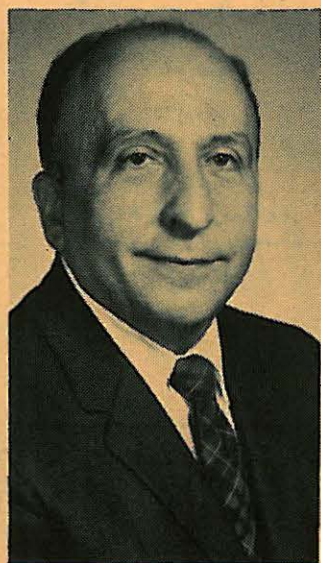
FINALLY THE MAIL brought the promised folder and I sat down reverently to study the history of my magnificent forbearers who fought, as the D. A. How about a new series entitled "My Great-Great-Great-Grandfather, the Spy?"
