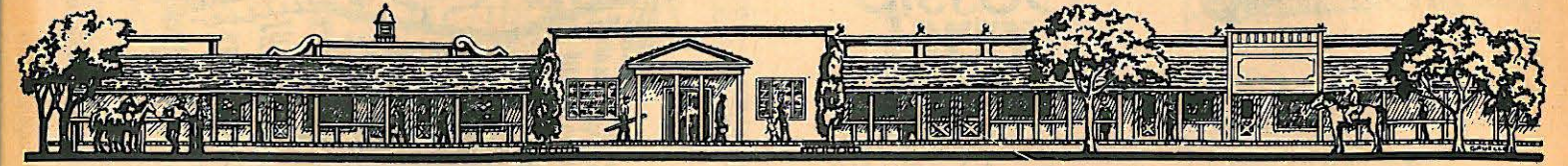

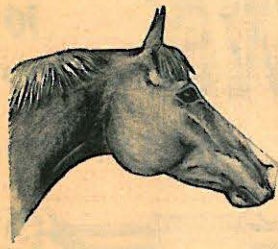

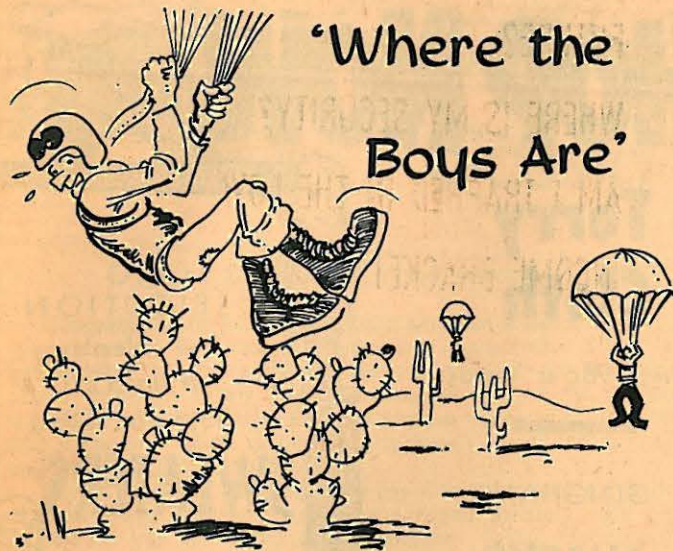
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'Where the

Pulsifer Sr. live in Lakeside along with his brothers Ronald and Edward and his sister Denise. He has a brother, Richard who lives in El Cajon. Burial was at Ft. Rosecrans National Cemetery and services were held Tuesday.

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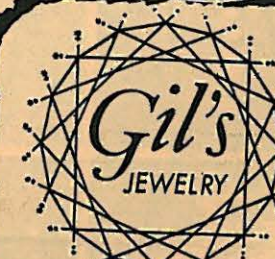

### Materials:

**RIBBON TREE**  
1 roll Norcross "Emerald Fashion Foil" gift wrap—150CR 568  
lightweight cardboard 31" x 42"  
4 rolls Norcross "Emerald Lustre-Tie" ribbon  
rubber cement  
scissors  
straight pin  
compass,  
ruler  
3" Christmas ball

**Instructions:** 1. To make tree form, score and fold in half lengthwise a 31" x 42" sheet of lightweight cardboard. NOTE: Use compass point and ruler for more accurate scoring.  
2. Cut tree shape out of folded cardboard. Cement "Emerald Fashion Foil" gift wrap to tree.  
3. To make fringe, cut several 9" lengths of "Emerald Lustre-Tie" ribbon. Cut more as needed. With a straight pin, slit ribbon lengthwise every 1/8", leaving a 1/2" margin at each end. Moisten ends and stick together, making fringe loops.  
4. Beginning at the bottom of the tree, cement fringe in overlapping rows. Continue this process until entire tree is covered with fringe. Add 3" Christmas ball to top of tree.

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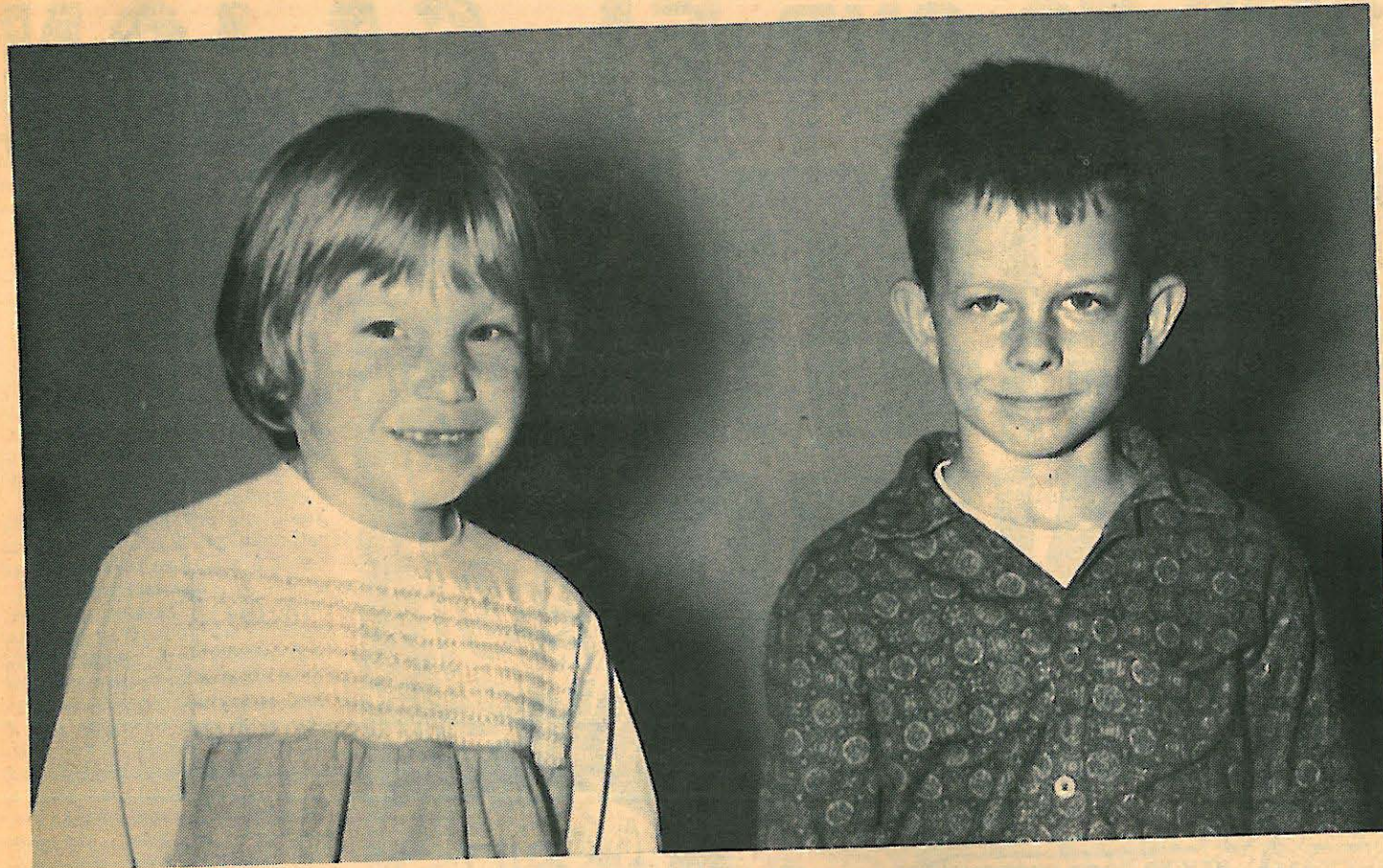

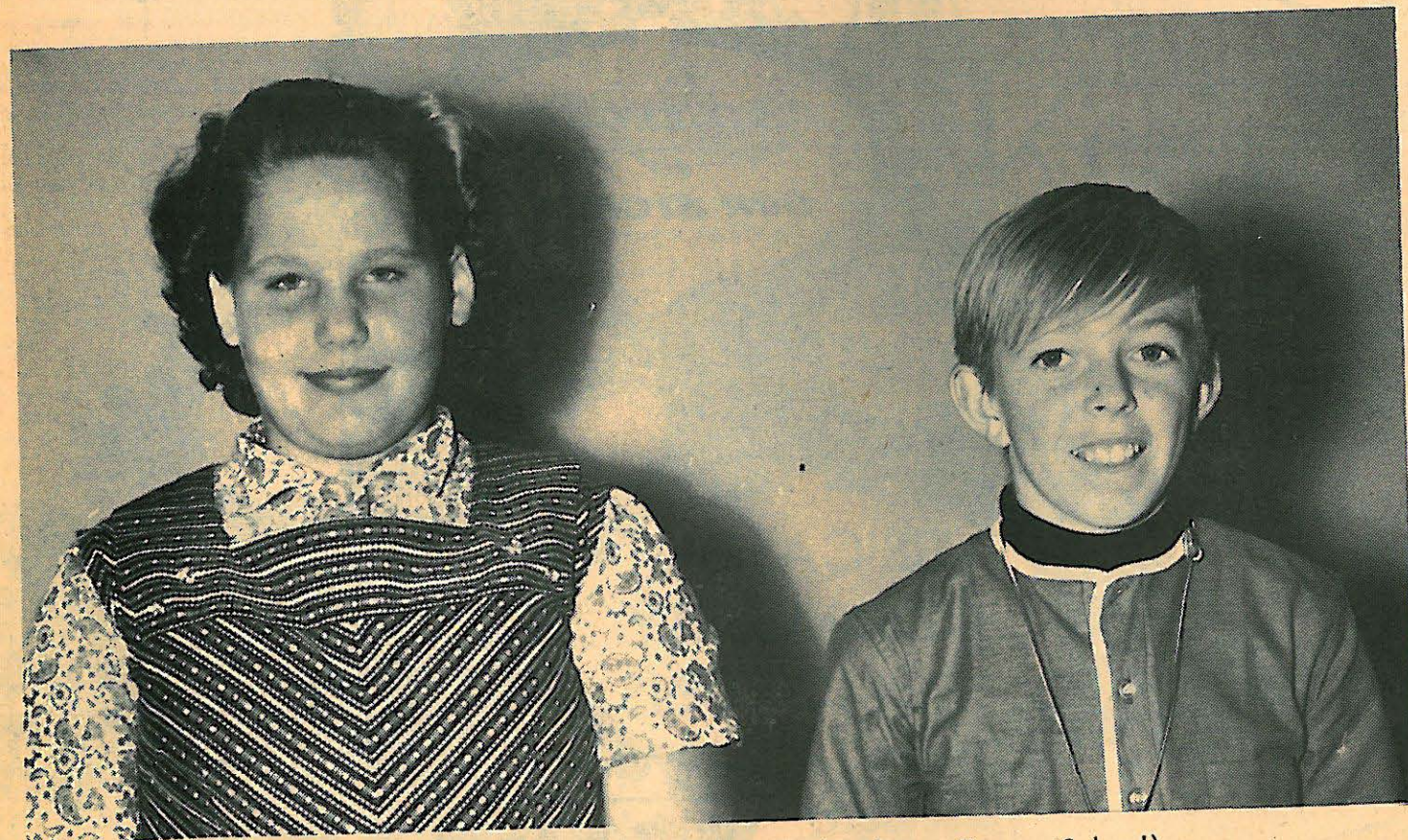

### First Aid Safety

If it hasn't happened to you in the first two-thirds of the year, statistics say it will probably occur in the remaining four months—you will be called on to render first aid in an emergency.

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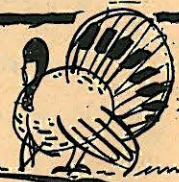
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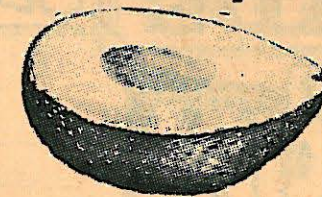
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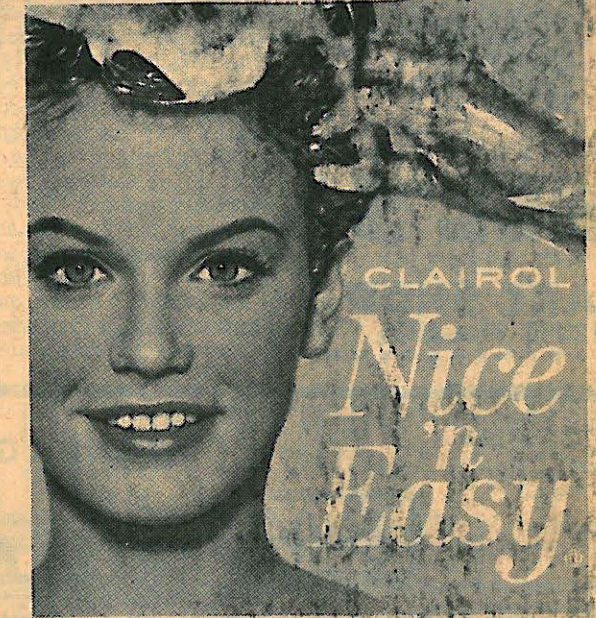

To: All State College Faculty Members  
 From: Presidents of AFT Locals in the California State Colleges

We hope that Governor-elect Reagan will think better of this particular proposal. However, should this investigation take place, we will support the University faculty in any necessary defense of the integrity of that institution.

So far the State Colleges have enjoyed comparative immunity from interference in their internal affairs, but any political investigation of higher education is potentially dangerous for us all. Any infringements on academic freedom in the California State Colleges must be vigorously resisted.

To make our position as AFT local presidents clear, we announce our intention to oppose, by all available means, any attempt to infringe upon the academic freedom of the State Col-

leges. We think all State College AFT members will act together on this issue.

We personally pledge our offices and our jobs to protect academic freedom in the California State Colleges.

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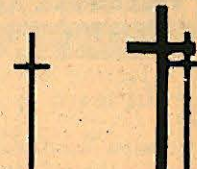

The students enjoyed the talks and pictures.

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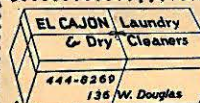
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
