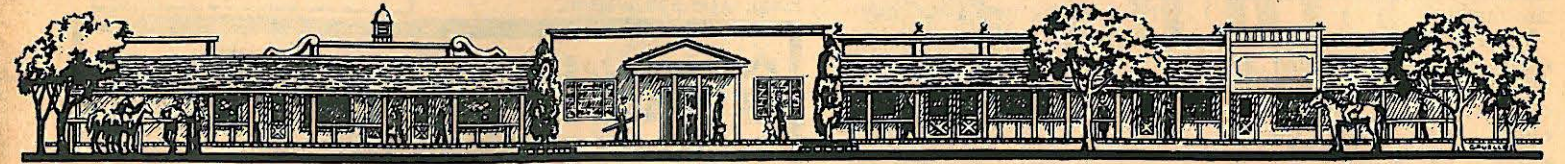

Editorial

Space problems necessarily limit our endorsements for the coming election. However, we have chosen a few that we feel to be most important. We have studied these candidates and the one issue. We urge that you also think carefully and elect men whom you know to be well qualified and men who will serve this state well.

Governor

EDMUND G. "PAT" BROWN, Democratic
Governor of the State of California

From the San Diego Union, Pete Kaye's column of Oct. 30, 1966: "Voters in small groups and large crowds warm instantly to the friendly, frank man who looks like the corner druggist or the family doctor."

"The governor is most convincing when he talks about himself — California's water plan, its system of higher education, the need to conserve its natural resources."

"He appears genuinely indignant at the thought of turning the state over to a man without political experience — a candidate Brown refers to as a 'soap salesman.'"

"At the same time, he shows no personal animosity toward Regan and admires the GOP nominee's campaign skills."

We recommend Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown for reelection because we are convinced of his sincerity. We believe he has made mistakes — all of us have. We also believe that the largest state in the Union, second only to the Federal Government in its complexity, should not be turned over to a totally untried and inexperienced man. We would consider that the equivalent of having a local mechanic perform brain surgery.

Lieutenant Governor

ROBERT H. FINCH, Republican
Attorney at Law

We consider Robert H. Finch to be an outstanding man. It is possible for Californians to split the ticket between the governor and the lieutenant governor.

"Politicians . . . have an obligation to appeal to the best in people, not to pander to the worst," Finch has said. "Leadership is risk: a bet placed on the decent impulses of a free people — not playing it safe, following meekly along according to the latest poll figures." He appears to be living up to those words. And in doing so he has sometimes been at odds with Ronald Reagan, meanwhile showing full loyalty in supporting the head of the GOP ticket. According to informed sources, the differences have been handled gracefully and his influence has blunted some of Reagan's rash impulses.

In our opinion, it would be an extremely healthy thing for the California GOP for Robert Finch to win this high office and we believe he could work well with Gov. Brown.

Representative in Congress 35th District

THOMAS B. LENHART, Democratic
Businessman

We sincerely believe that a change is needed in the 35th Congressional District and recommend Thomas B. Lenhart for Congressman. A long interview with Mr. Lenhart recently convinced us of his ability and we urge a vote for Thomas B. Lenhart for Congressman in the 35th District.

Much has been said concerning Proposition 16. Many months ago we began to print material against this proposition. We were gratified to see that the Christian Science Monitor, one of the most respected newspapers in the nation agrees with us on this point. The San Diego Union and finally, the San Diego Evening Tribune also came out against this proposition. It is clearly unconstitutional, according to legal experts. It could even mean that the Bible might be ruled as an obscene book. We cannot believe that this would be a "mandate of the people" when they are voting for bad legislation. We urge a no vote on proposition 16. We also urge that you contact your state representatives and ask that they study this problem and make an attempt to solve it.

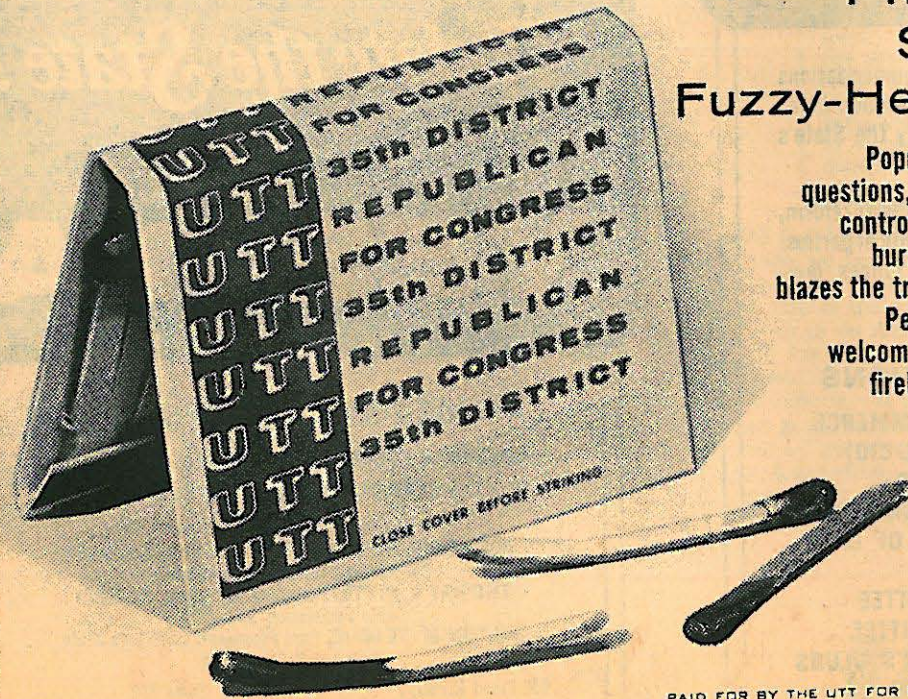

Yes Vote Urged

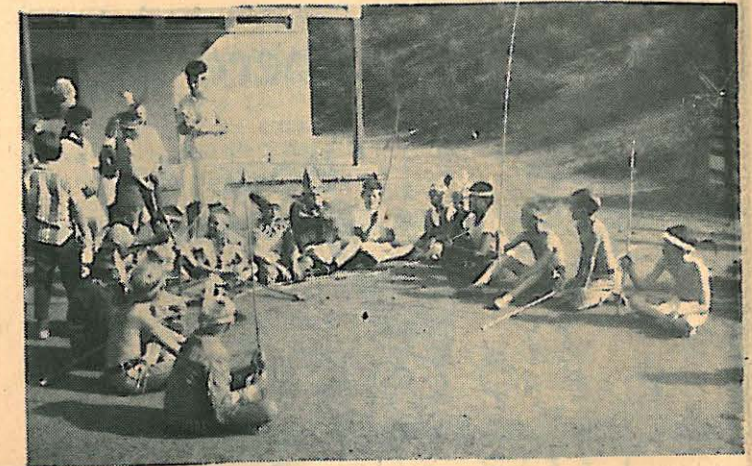

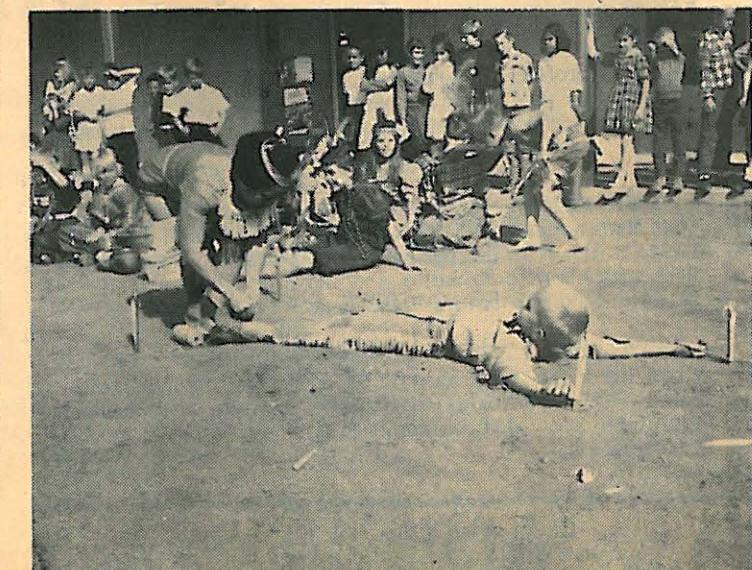

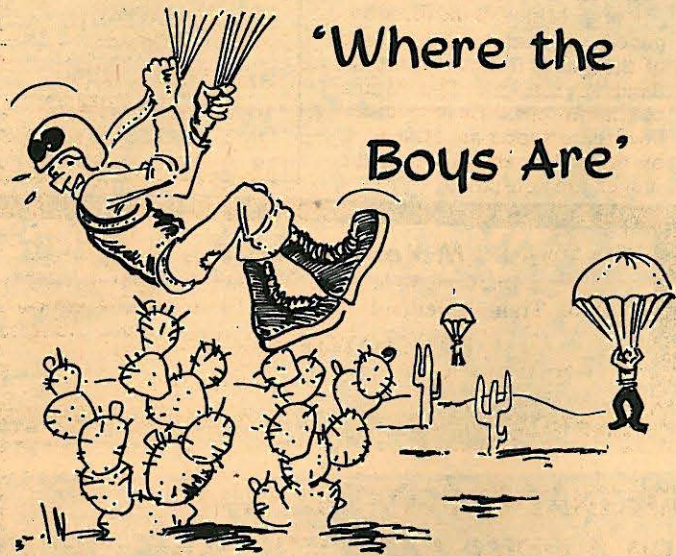

Widows Urged To Check

Many widows may be unaware of a change in the social security law and still think they have to wait until they become 62 to collect social security widow's benefits. This is the concern of Arlyn B. Carr, District Manager of Social Security in San Diego.

Until the change in the law, effective September, 1965, the widow of a man who had worked under social security could not qualify for monthly widow's benefits until she reached 62. Now, she can elect to have her payments start as early as her 60th birthday, but in smaller installments to take account of the longer time that benefits will be paid.

Carr pointed out that generally women who choose to take these reduced benefits will collect about the same value in benefits over the

years. He urged widows, she may have been waiting for their 62nd birthday, to call or visit the social security office to find out how the age-60 benefits would work out in their particular case.

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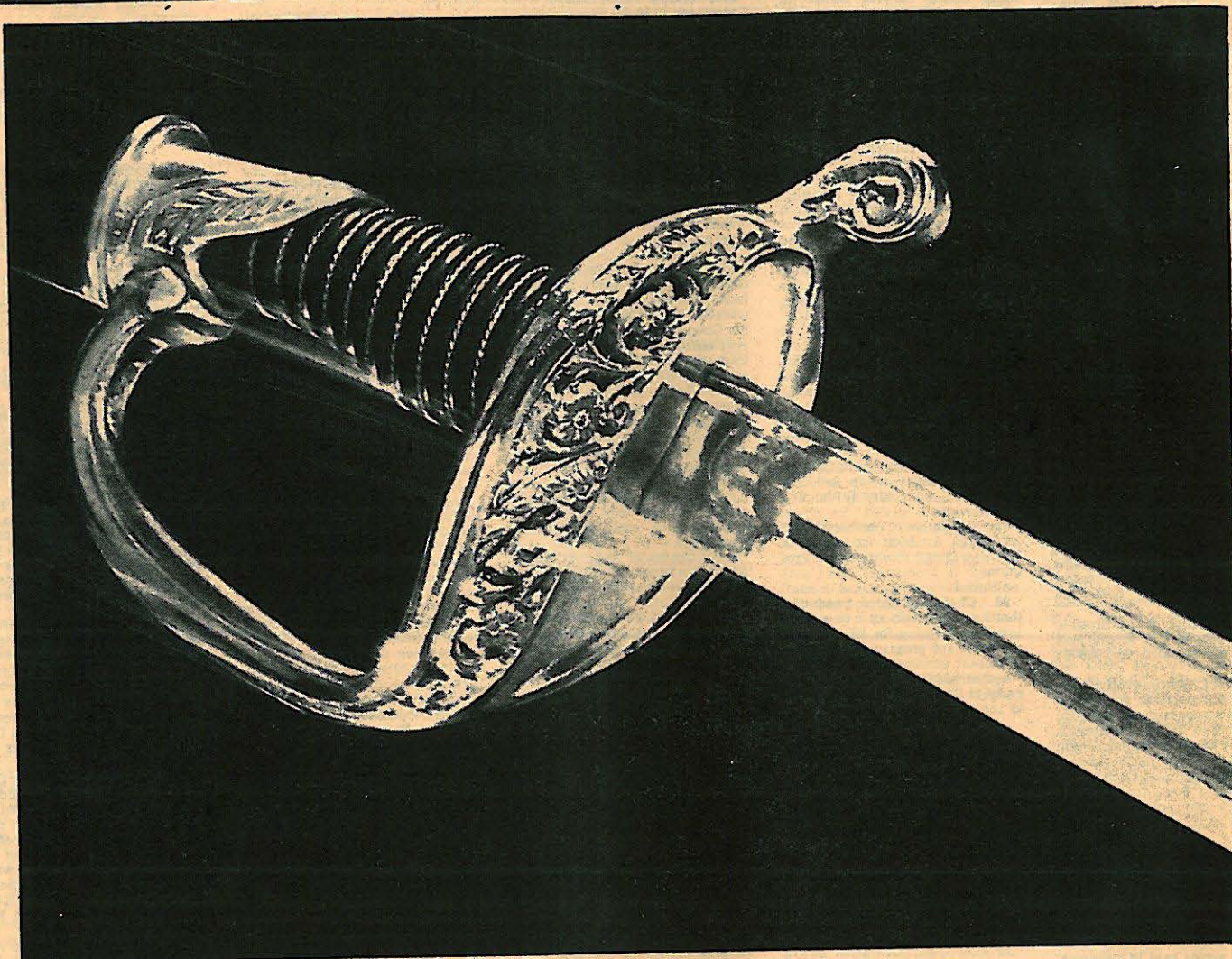
