

Fictitious Firm Name

BEEN LEGALLY REGISTERED?

The requirements of Section 2466 of the Civil Code, says "Every person and every partnership transacting business—under a fictitious firm name—must file a certificate stating the names in full and the place of residence of such person and the member or members of such partnership—such certificate must be published, once a week for four consecutive weeks."

If you have neglected this procedure, do you realize that the name of your firm is not protected and that you are not entitled to maintain suits for collection, or for other purposes, in the courts of the State of California?

New Year Customs Many In Japan

The most popular illustrations on Japanese Christmas cards are of the stork and the turtle. These represent the wish for a long and healthy life, apparently, as the stork is supposed to live 1,000 years and the turtle said to live for 10,000 years.

Also popular are illustrations of the Seven Gods of Good Fortune and the Pine tree, which symbolizes good fortune.

Most Japanese merchants send

cards to their customers.

It is also traditional for bells to welcome the Japanese New Year. The bells ring out 108 times on New Year's Eve, reminding the people of the 108 commandments of Buddha.

One interesting old Japanese custom is the spreading of parched beans about the house, in the belief that such drives away evil spirits and invites good luck to enter the household.

UNIQUE CALENDAR

The Moslem calendar is unique in that the twelve months of the year begin with the approximate new moon without any in-tercalculation to keep them geared to the seasonal equinoxes. Thus the months, and New Years, too — retrograde through the entire year in about 33½ years.







BIG TREES

Annually, the most famous and most photographed Christmas trees in the United States are those erected on the White House lawn and at Rockefeller Center in New York. The 1958 White House tree, an Engelmann spruce selected from the Kootenai National Forest in Montana, was so large it had to be loaded on two flatcars for the trip to Washington. It was trimmed to 78 feet before being raised and decorated, yet was still the tallest ever used on the White House lawn. The Rockefeller Center tree that same year was 65 feet high and 35 feet in diameter at the base. It came from Maine and was selected only after an intensive nine-month search to find the most perfectly shaped tree possible.





Black Forest Torte

CAKE: Heat oven to 350°F. Brush sides and bottom of four 9-inch roud layer pans with Chiffon Soft-Type Margarine. Bake only 2 layers at a time, if desired. Measure into large mixer bowl 134 cups Gold Medal Flour, 134 cups sugar, 11/4 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. Calumet Baking Powder, 2/3 cup Chiffon Soft-Type Margarine, 4 sqs. (1 oz. each) Baker's Unsweetened Chocolate melted and cooled, 11/4 cups water and 1 tsp. vanilla. Beat at low speed to blend; then beat 2 minutes at medium speed, scraping sides and bottom of bowl frequently. Add 3 eggs. Beat 2 minutes more. Pour 1/4 of batter (about 1 cup) into each pan. Lavers will be thin. Bake 15 to 18 minutes, or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool slightly and remove from pan. Cool thoroughly.



from what he had expected.




