




E.L. FREELAND DIES ON BIRTHDAY

Eugene L. Freeland, resident of Alpine for the last 12 years, succumbed to a heart attack Saturday evening at 7:30 in Mercy Hospital. Mr. Freeland was 71 the day he died.

Willow Glen Farm occupied much of Mr. Freeland's attention following his move to Alpine, where he was a partner with Margaret Lowthian. Together they raised prize-winning Rhodesian Ridgeback and English Pointer dogs. They also raised and showed some of the finest prize-winning Appaloosa horses in the country.

Mr. Freeland was born in Hepner, Oregon on Dec. 3, 1895. He graduated with a degree in chemical engineering from Oregon Agricultural College in 1921. He was a charter member and first president of Oregon Beta Chapter of Phi Kappa Psi.

A prominent civil and structural engineer in San Diego County since 1923, Mr. Freeland was founder of the firms. Freeland and Bird, Engineer and Architect and Freeland Evenson and Christensen, civil engineers. He began his career as an engineer with the bureau of public roads, in the state of Oregon. He came to San Diego County in 1923 as a county highway engineer.

In 1933 he did engineering work for the Mexican government on the Tijuana-Ensenada highway. In 1935 he was an engineer for the Southern Pacific Railway on the San Diego and Arizona Eastern Railroad for the construction of the tunnel system in Carrizo Gorge.

During the depression years. Mr. Freeland was director of operations for S.E.R.A., P.W.A., W.P.A. for Orange and San Diego Counties.

The firms with which Mr. Freeland was connected were the district architects and engineers for the Chula Vista Schools. He was instrumental in the passage of laws by the State Legislature for state aid to school buildings to enable school districts to expand facilities to meet the influx of population in the California Schools following World War II.

The firm, Freeland and Bird, designed dog and horse race tracks in Arizona, Tijuana, Florida and Arkansas, They also designed the new County Court house, the County Hospital, Juvenile Hall, the Fifth Avenue Financial Center and the new hotel of C. Arnholt Smith and John Alessio. Also among their credits are subdivisions in Rancho Bernardo, Clairmont, San Carlos and others. The Aviary at the San Diego Zoo was also designed by Freeland and Bird.

Alpine will remember Mr. Freeland's work as a fire commissioner and member of the board of the Chamber of Commerce. He was instrumental in bringing water to the Alpine area and he was founder of the Alpine Heights Municipal Water District. He also published the Alpine Echo for about two and one half years.

Survivors include his wife Vera; a son Eugene Lincoln; a daughter, Mrs. Rita A. White, one sister Mrs. Elaine Rietmann and five grandchildren. Services are scheduled for Wednesday. December 7 at 2 p.m. at Benbough's Mortuary.

Funds Raised

A check for \$14,000 will be sent to national headquarters of Ducks Unlimited in Chicago by the San Diego DU steering committee, according to George W. Cowan of Lakeside 1966 DU chairman.

The money was raised in a single evening early last month during the 23rd annual San Diego DU fund-raising party held at Hotel Del Coronado. It will help to finance the Lake Elser project in Alberta. More than 800 attended the event, one of the city's top social affiars.

Ducks Unlimited is an international, nonprofit organization dedicated to perpetuating the waterfowl supply by restoring duck marshlands in the Canadian prairie provinces where 80 per cent of all American waterfowl are said to raise their

Cowan said that since money derived from the sale of duck stamps in the U.S. cannot be sent out of the country, DU obtains financial aid through vol-untary contributions and committee-sponsored projects, like the San Diego DU Party. Its members and supporters range from wealthy businessmen to ordinary duck hunters, who donate their time and funds to help carry on DU's conservation work.

A DENSE FOG may be quite romantic when you are snug and warm at home in front of the fireplace with a good book, but not when you are driving. Especially at night. Robert called me at work during the worst of a recent fog attack and said "Do you think you can drive home in this or shall I come and get you" From where I am it will take at least an hour I peered out the window and decided the atmosphere wasn't too impenetrable. That car simply does not operate properly in reverse—it always goes backward so rapidly I feel there must be some mechanical defect of some sort. I went forward again as soon as I heard the mailbox crunching under my tires and I was most fortunate not to hit the telephone pole. I don't know what the penalty for attacking a telephone pole is but I imagine it is pretty severe.

I WAS AS cautious as could be about finding the road again and I did get out of the ditch without too much trouble. There was a lot of smoke coming from the exhaust and the motor was making very strange noises. I couldn't see anything ahead of me and it was when I struck the white picket fence I realized I was definitely turned around and going the wrong way. The fence wasn't injured the least bit, luckily, but in my haste to get away I punched the wrong buttons and the car stopped dead. I tried desperately to start it but absolutely nothing happened. I stepped frantically on the gas. I turned the key in all directions. I clicked the buttons. Nothing.

A LIGHT CAME on in a window and a man came out and said, "Having trouble?" "My car won't start," I said, as my neighbor peered in the window at me. "Oh, "he said, "it's you," I didn't care for his tone but I did need help. "You have probably flooded the engine," he said, "wait a minute or so, then put your foot down firmly on the starter. Flat. DON'T JIGGLE!" They always say don't jiggle—I have news for all these men—the only way I ever start that car is by jiggling. So when he was staring out into the fog and not paying attention, I jiggled. Sure enough, the engine roared into life, he pointed out my way, I smiled sweetly and followed the road to my own porch light, If I hadn't jiggled, I'd still be there. Robert said "Did you have any trouble getting home?" and I said calmly, "None at all." I feel there is no use in worrying anyone unnecessarily!
