SAN MARCOS — "My sup-port of the United States' Viet Nam policy cost me CDC endorsement for the 80th Assembly District," said Roy "Pat" Archer, one of three seeking the Democratic nomination in the 80th.

Although I am opposed to a further escalation of the war, I don't think we should withdraw or negotiate with the Viet Cong as the legitimate government of the rebel areas of South Viet Nam, " explained Archer.

"Although I would like to have CDC endorsement, I am not about to compromise my beliefs. I will win the pri-mary in June because no Democratic candidate can win by running in opposition to President Johnson's and Governor Brown's stand on

Viet Nam, "said Archer.
