TEL-FACTS FOR YEAR 1965

Have you ever given thought to the number of telephones in the El Cajon Valley? As of December 1965 there were exactly 46,559. Naturally, it takes people to service and maintain these telephones. We have 133 employees located in the El Cajon Valley. in the El Cajon Valley exchange to do this work. That's approximately 1 employee for every 350 telephones.

The estimated local payroll of the El Cajon exchange is

Total taxes paid by the Pacific Company within the major incorporated city were, \$284,801. This compares to \$264,-021,979 paid throughout the state of California.

These figures are pretty sizeable, however, another way to look at it is \$32.37 was paid by the Pacific Company in operating taxes for every telephone in the state of California.

Another interesting fact is the expenditures for construction. During 1965, \$445,180,167 was spent and an estimated \$438 million is planned for 1966.

I always try to give the person I'm calling time to stop what he's doing and get to the phone. 7 rings just about does it.
