





Editorial

We have written the story this week that we had hoped would never have to be writ-

As many of you may remember, several months ago, we took a stand on teenage crime. We said that when teenagers were apprehended we would print not only their names but the names of their parents. Unfortunately, eleven burglaries occurred last week. These burglaries were apparently the result of the action of five of our teenagers.

We are aware that many newspapers across the land have taken this same stand. And in the areas where the newspapers do print the names of juveniles, the rate of crime by juveniles has dropped considerably. We would hope that this would have the same effect in

Some may say this is a first offense. However - count them. One, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven. Had the youngsters stopped with the first burglary we might have withheld the names. But they did not. These can scarecely be called first offenses.

Listen to J. Edgar Hoover: "Most difficulty with youthful offenders stems from the home where a sound sense of values is diminishing. Parents need to stress discipline, guidance, and morality, and to play down indulgence, pleasure, and money. Protective coddling by some courts of 'tender-age' repeaters is an appeasement of justice. It infringes on the rights of the people. I say let the flagrant violators be exposed. Let the public know their identities so it may be alert to their law-breaking habits."

Once more, hear J. Edgar Hoover: "Over the years I have strongly emphasized the vital necessity for law enforcement and the public to know the identities of those persons regardless of age, who threaten the welfare of our communities. Fear of social censure has long been one of the basic deterrents to wrongdoing. In this respect, the growing trend of public opinion in favor of unmasking the flagrant juvenile violator is indeed encouraging."
