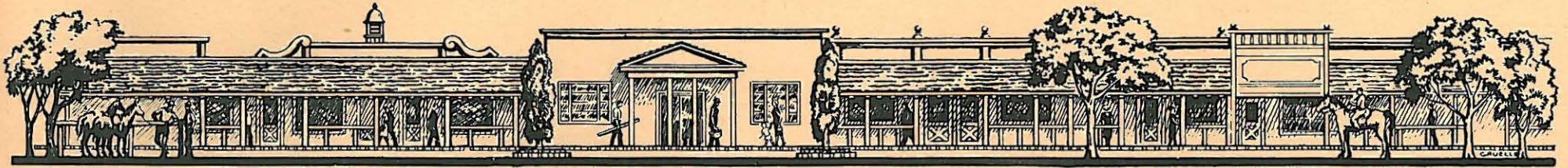

ALPINE — Contrary to the report received last week, the scheduled date for the opening of Interstate 8 freeway that concerns this community so vitally, was not held on the 15th.

According to H.R. Hecht who was resident engineer for the Division of Highways, the contractor that was to place the signs was not able to get them in place on time and this accounted for the delay.

The project will extend Interstate 8 to the Harbison Canyon Road area just west of Alpine. The completion of the Lake Jennings Park interchange is scheduled as is the interchange connecting existing U. S. 80 with Interstate 8 at Dunbar Lane.

Construction was carried out under two separate contracts. The first four miles was built by the Daley Corporation with the remaining one and one-half miles being built by C.W. McGrath Construction Co.

Child Dies on South Grade

ALPINE — Tragedy struck at 3:55 p. m. Friday when little nine-year-old Beverly Williams of 1290 South Grade Rd. was hit by a car driven by Mary Hollywood of Del Mar.

Beverly was badly injured as she ran in front of the moving car, and died, coincidentally, at 3:55 Saturday afternoon. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Williams who had not lived at the address very long.

Mrs. Hollywood, owner of the Alpine Heights Guest Home was not cited. The accident occurred in front of the child's home.

Inquiries revealed that the speed limit for county roads such as South Grade Rd. is 65 miles per hour. The vehicle that struck the girl was going considerably slower than the speed limit and well within the safety requirements, according to the Highway Patrol.

EDITOR'S NOTE: We have had many calls from parents, some who knew little Beverly, to caution all other parents to be very careful that their children do not play, or run out, into any of the roads in this area. The speed limit is 65, and it takes only a second to snuff out a small life. We are glad to issue this warning, in the hope that some other child's life may be saved. As all of us know, who drive these roads, it is difficult to avoid even the dogs and rabbits that scamper in front of us as we travel. Only action of the Board of Supervisors could bring down the speed limit, and the chance of that action is slim, since houses are scattered in areas such as those where Beverly died. We join with all parents in issuing a warning to those who have perhaps become careless, or to those who do not know how fast cars may legally travel these roads. DO NOT ALLOW YOUR CHILDREN TO PLAY IN THESE ROADS, OR TO CROSS UNAIDED.

A TRIBUTE

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Rather than try to "edit" the following letter, we have decided that all in Alpine would like to hear the remarks made by Mrs. H.S. Ford at the recent tea given for former residents of Alpine. Therefore, we are printing her remarks in full.)

Town and Country News

Dear Sirs:

I am herewith sending you a copy of my remarks made at the Silver Tea, given for Mr. and Mrs. Ingels by the Alpine Church Guild in Fuller Hall, May 18th as requested by you.

When I was asked to say a few words today, I immediately wondered, "How can one say just a few words about loved members of our church family like the Ingels?" It is a little like some member of our personal family moving out to another community. While they are with us, we may not keep telling them how much they mean to us, and although we know we will see them from time to time, after they go we feel a sense of loss just the same.

We don't want to make this a "This is Your Life" affair, but thought we would like to touch on a few highlights of their years of service and Christian fellowship in our church.

Mr. and Mrs. Ingels and their lovely daughter Sharon joined our church in 1949 and, except for the years between terms, I think Mr. Ingels has served most of that time as a Deacon. In this capacity, he has been solidly behind any suggestion or plan for the betterment of the church. This was borne out as he gave generously of his time and money in both our building campaigns for the Church and for the Education Building.

Besides sharing these activities with her husband, Mrs. Ingels sang in our choir, and as health permitted, has quietly given of herself and her time in the activities of our Guild wherever she might be needed. Her sweet smile, and her Christian personality

has been an inspiration to all of us, I'm sure, as we worked together, for our church, through the Guild.

Another wonderful contribution was Sharon. Of course she became a member of our Sunday School, and as she grew older, became a great help in the Sunday School work, and also with the Daily Vacation Bible School, and was a lovely "Mary" for three years in our Christmas Pageant. She was also active in the Pilgrim Fellowship, having served in all offices including president. With her Mother, she sang in our choir until, as all girls should and do, she got married. She left Alpine but her love for the Church School did not stop there for she and her husband gave generously to the Education Building Fund.

These are some of the tangible contributions the Ingels' have made to our church but far more important I think, are their spiritual contributions. Some of you may remember The Adult Bible Class — they were so faithful in their attendance and supported whole-heartedly the projects the class undertook. One of these we still have today, our gifts to the American Missions.

Then there was the Prayer and Bible Study Group, and it was here, as we met each week in the quiet of a private home, to study God's Word, and pray for the needs of our Country, our Church, our Missions, to pray for those who were sick or in trouble, to me, it was here that their real worth shone like a beacon light. Through their audible prayers and their knowledge of the Bible, they were on speaking terms with God, and we need such in our church.

I am sure it is this spiritual quality which has endeared Mr. and Mrs. Ingels to all of us . . . and is the reason we have taken this means to tell them so.

Discouraged, but not defeated, he began a campaign of mending and patching, but I knew how to thwart him. Finally he gave up in despair. "I will try," he said, "to think of some other kind of wall." Again I was devious: I took to bringing home magazines from the library; "Better Homes and Gardens," "House Beautiful," "American Home," and decorating books, featuring picket fences. I did not show them to Robert — I left them lying invitingly open on tables and on couches and even on his work bench in the basement.

THEN ONE LOVELY night I came home from work and there was my white picket fence, a thing of beauty, installed in one day by Robert and Cavanaugh and a couple of strange workmen. I was inordinately pleased. Robert was delighted that he had made me happy and thought it was all his own idea. The dogs are now securely inside, we have no worries, and I am proud of our new acquisition . . . there is just one thing, though: I have been looking at some new magazines featuring the most gorgeous brick walls, and I think brick would be just ideal for this site. I do love brick . . . I can't imagine anything more attractive. I think all I will have to do is saw away at the bottom of some of the boards in the fence . . . you know, dogs can't possibly get out, over or under a sturdy brick wall!

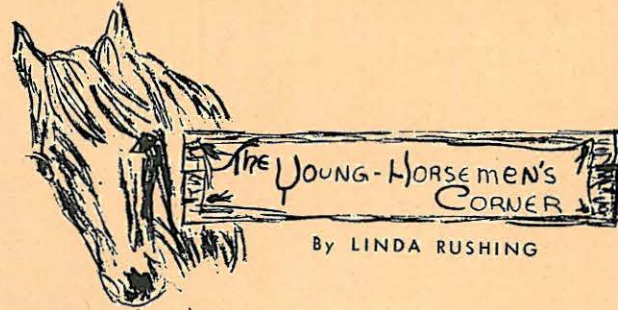

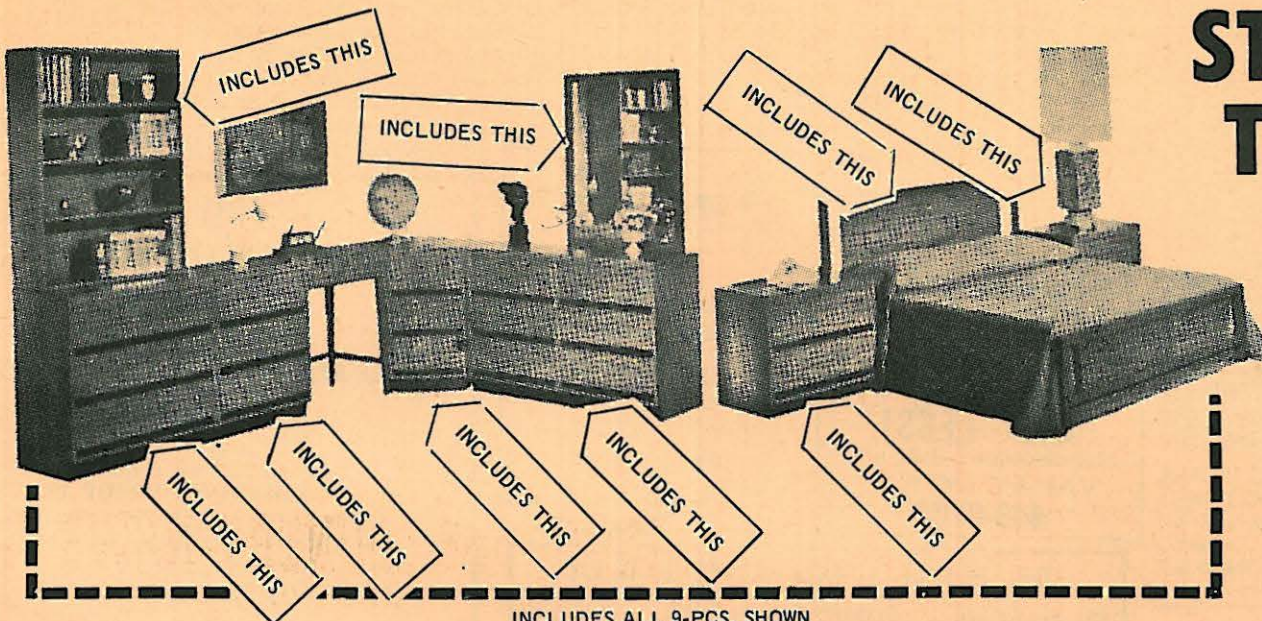

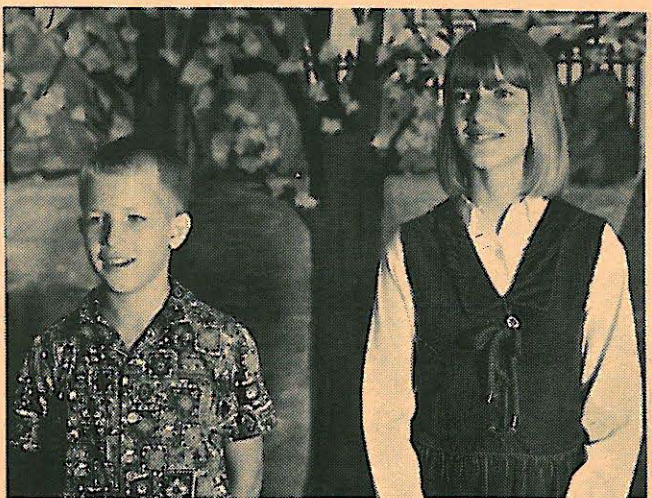

IRS EXPLAINS

LOS ANGELES — Generally speaking, selection of returns for audits is based on carefully developed criteria designed to identify those returns where the greatest chance of error exists. In addition, some returns are selected at random so that no class of returns is assured of exemption from audit.

On most of the returns, IRS wants to make sure that the taxpayer actually made the contributions he claims, or paid the doctor's bills, or suffered the casualty loss he said he did. Good records — cancelled checks, paid bills and receipts — will usually lead to the acceptance of the return as filed.

The underlying objective of the entire audit program is to bolster the voluntary compliance tax system. Audits and other enforcement actions help assure all taxpayers that the foolish few who flaunt the tax laws are caught and that each taxpayer pays just his fair share of taxes — no more and no less.

Here with the wonders made for man.

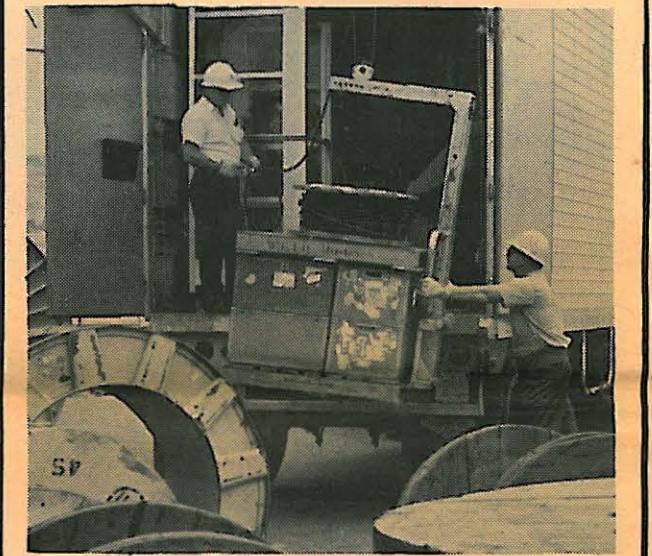

If You Live Here...

When spraying . . . roses and other plants, be sure to hit the undersides of leaves. Tomato plants may . . . still be set out now. Set them slightly deeper in the ground than they were growing in nursery containers.

Pinch out . . . the growing tips of new bedding plants after transplanting them from nursery flats. This encourages bushier growth, sturdier plants and more bloom later. Mulch around . . . fuchsias with peat moss, bark or steer manure. Feed them frequently and pinch back new growth to promote side branching.
