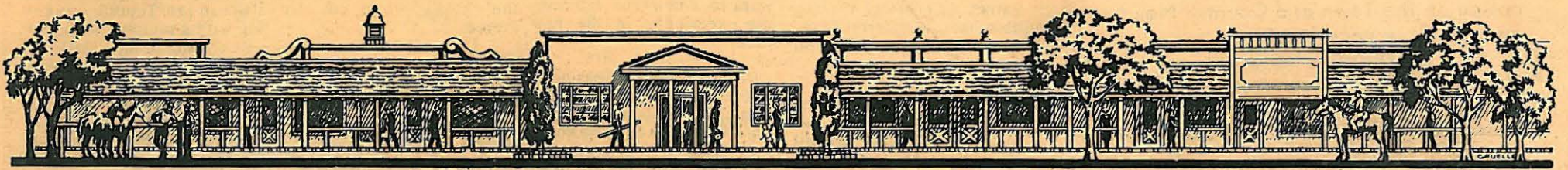

Adoption Week - Rodney



SANDIEGO— This is Adoption Week in the County, by Proclamation of the San Diego County Board of Supervisors at its session Tuesday. The Supervisors presented the proclamation to Homer E. Detriect, director of the Department of Public Welfare who accepted it in behalf of the Adoption Services Section. Detriect commented that his agency, the first licensed public adoption agency in the State, has located permanent adoptive homes

for over 3,000 children during the last eighteen years. Dave Kocurek, a well-known sports figure and adoptive father of two children, introduced several children, all available for adoption. William G. Oyos, who was selected Adoptive Father of the Year, was honored. All of his three children have been adopted. The Oyos plan to adopt at least one more child. It was reported to the Supervisors, that every month

under recently simplified procedures, Adoption Services of San Diego County places between 35 and 40 children in permanent homes. "There is no waiting list for adoption and the average length of time for placement of a child, is under five months. It is hoped that this week, Adoption Week, will call the public's attention to the simpler and realistic requirements and procedures which make it possible for many more families to adopt children.

RABIES FOUND

ALPINE— Dr. R. J. McFarland, DVM, confirmed rabies in a young fox shot and killed on the property of J. M. Cunningham last week.

Various reports of several animals (foxes) shot in Alpine apparently with rabies had been unconfirmed.

However, the process for being sure that an animal has the disease often takes a great deal of time.

The Town and Country News talked to the County Veterinarian concerning the danger. He warned that all parents should make sure that their children understand that they must not approach a wild animal. For that animal may not only have rabies he may have other diseases.

When asked if cats (the domestic type) could catch the disease, he replied that if a cat were bitten, it was entirely possible. However the nature of a cat is such that it would more than likely not come that close to a rabid animal. But as an extra precaution for the family and for the pet cat, it should be vaccinated for rabies. He suggested that persons concerned check with their regular veterinarian.

FIRE AVERTED

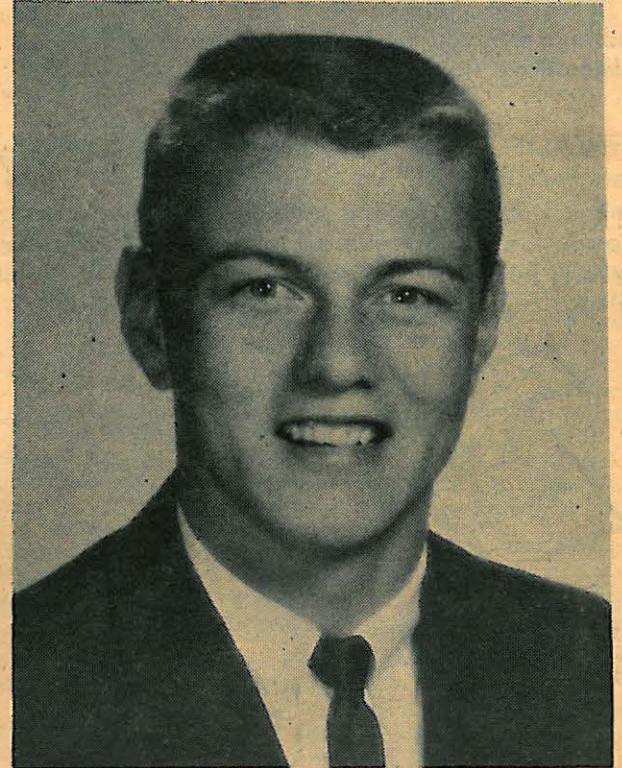

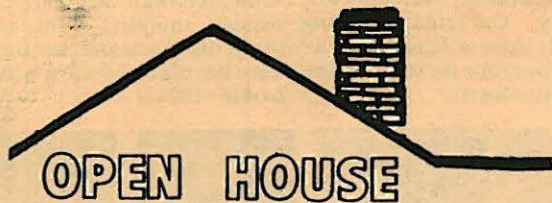

lovely home on Alpine Terrace.

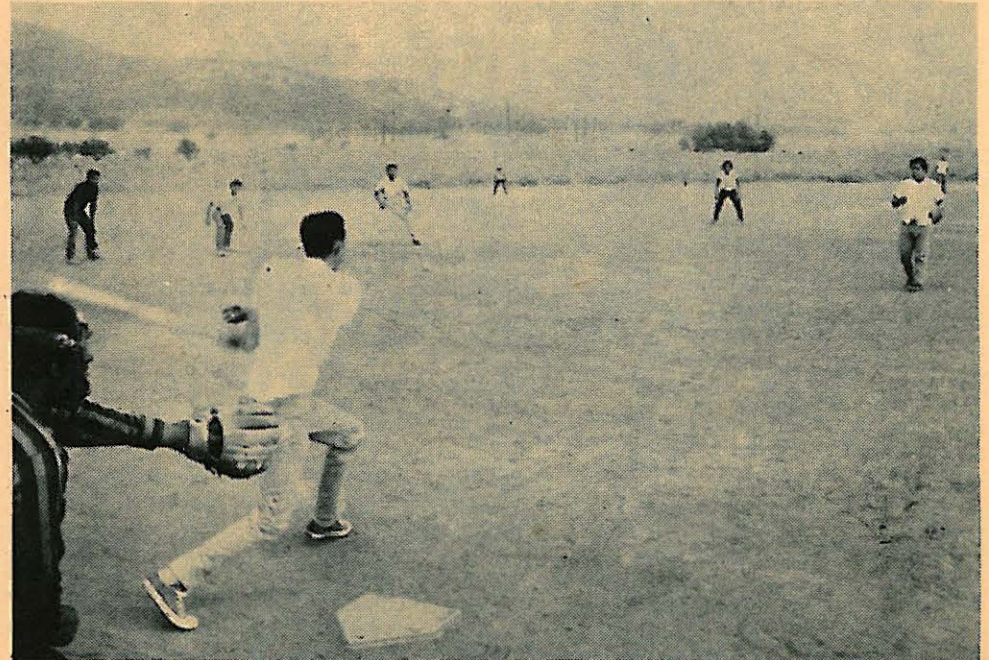
Phil Hall Sick Again

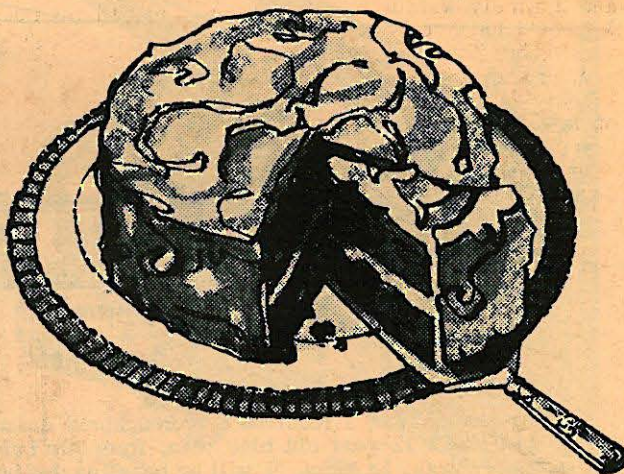

LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON!

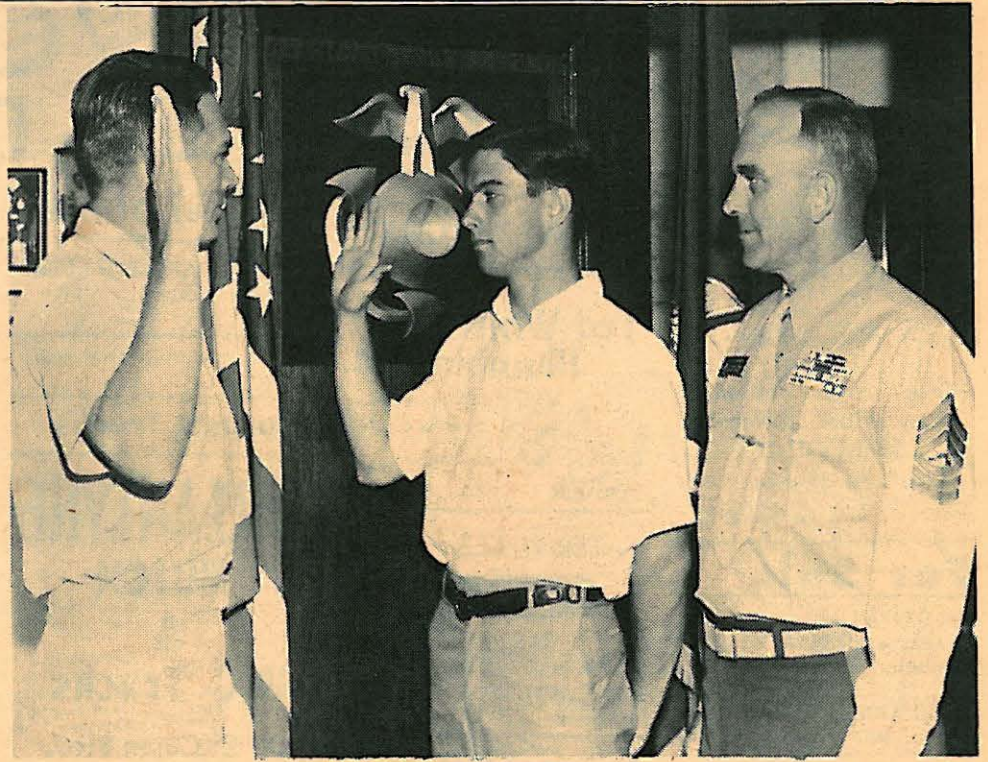
