



She felt that she would like to share it with us and we thought it so refreshing and fascinating that we wanted to pass it on to you in this column. I am sure the boys in the service, and especially those in the Asiatic area, will get a real chuckle from it and perhaps a roar of approval for this keen-witted humorist. I, for one, hope to have the extreme pleasure of meeting him if ever he comes to Alpine.

This is how he ended his, at first personal, and then newsy report to his sister.

ISSUED IN SOLEMN WARNING, this 15th day of May, 1966, to friends, relatives and neighbors of W. William Rose, Qui Nhon, Viet Nam, formerly of 402 Elm Street, Clarksburg, West Virginia.






