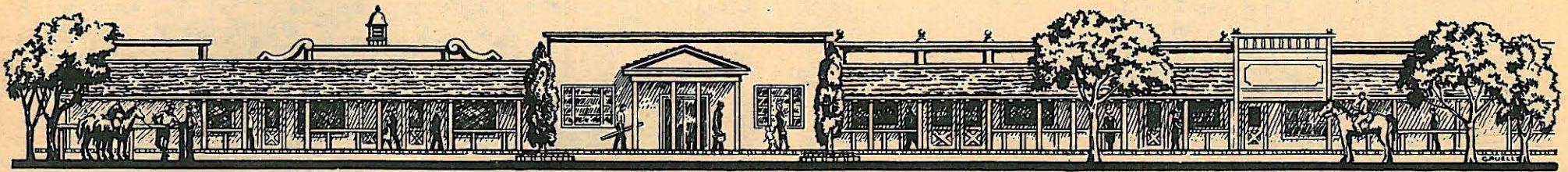

Town Council Meets Friday

A "Know Your Community Planning" talk will be sponsored by the Alpine Town Council, Friday evening at 8 p. m. in Fuller Hall.

Roger Courtney, San Diego Planning Department will provide a speaker. The talk is open to the public and a question-and-answer session will follow.

The Town Council is currently offering a series of once-a-month, informative, community-oriented programs to help stimulate interest in Alpine activities and to present current problems facing the community.

Villagers, to date, have heard speakers and have participated in discussions concerning youth activities,

school district unification, the rabies epidemic, sewage disposal and county taxes.

The Alpine Town Council is a non-partisan body organized to serve a communication liaison function for the rapidly expanding community and to represent the interests of the community as they are affected by legislature, county agencies and various private enterprises.

ALPINE — With school in progress, the new hours for the Youth Center have been set for the following days:

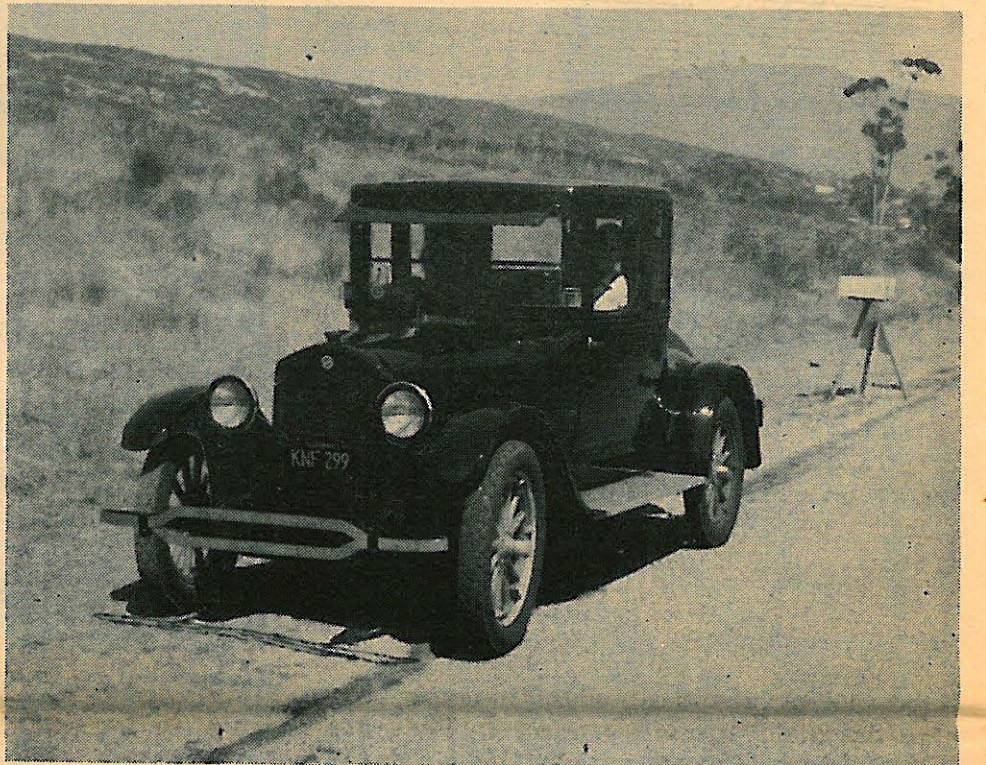
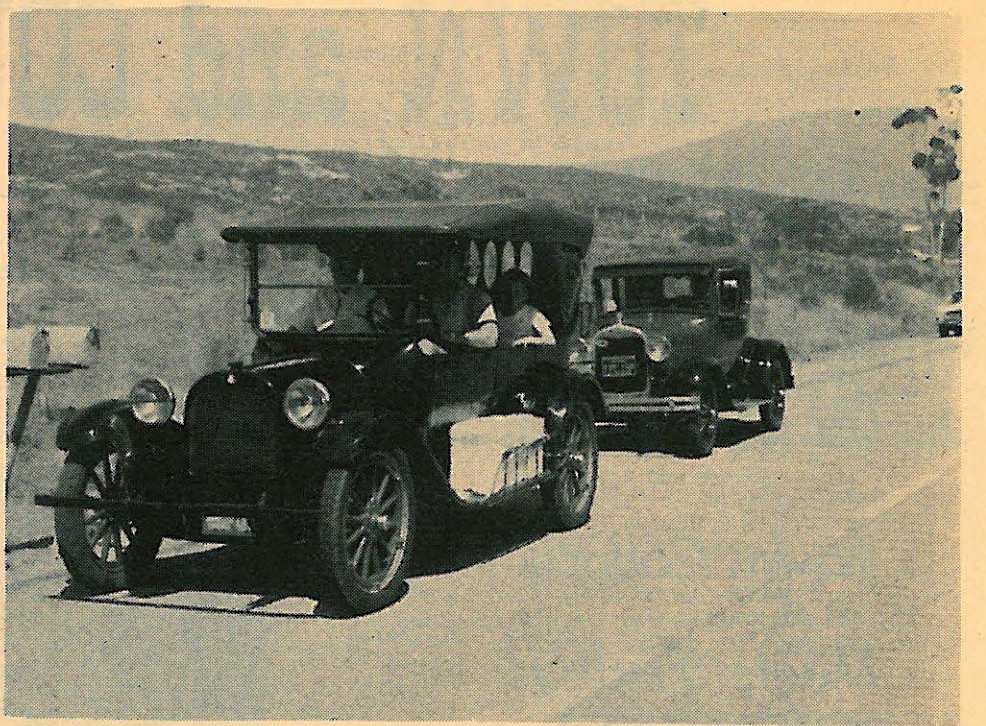
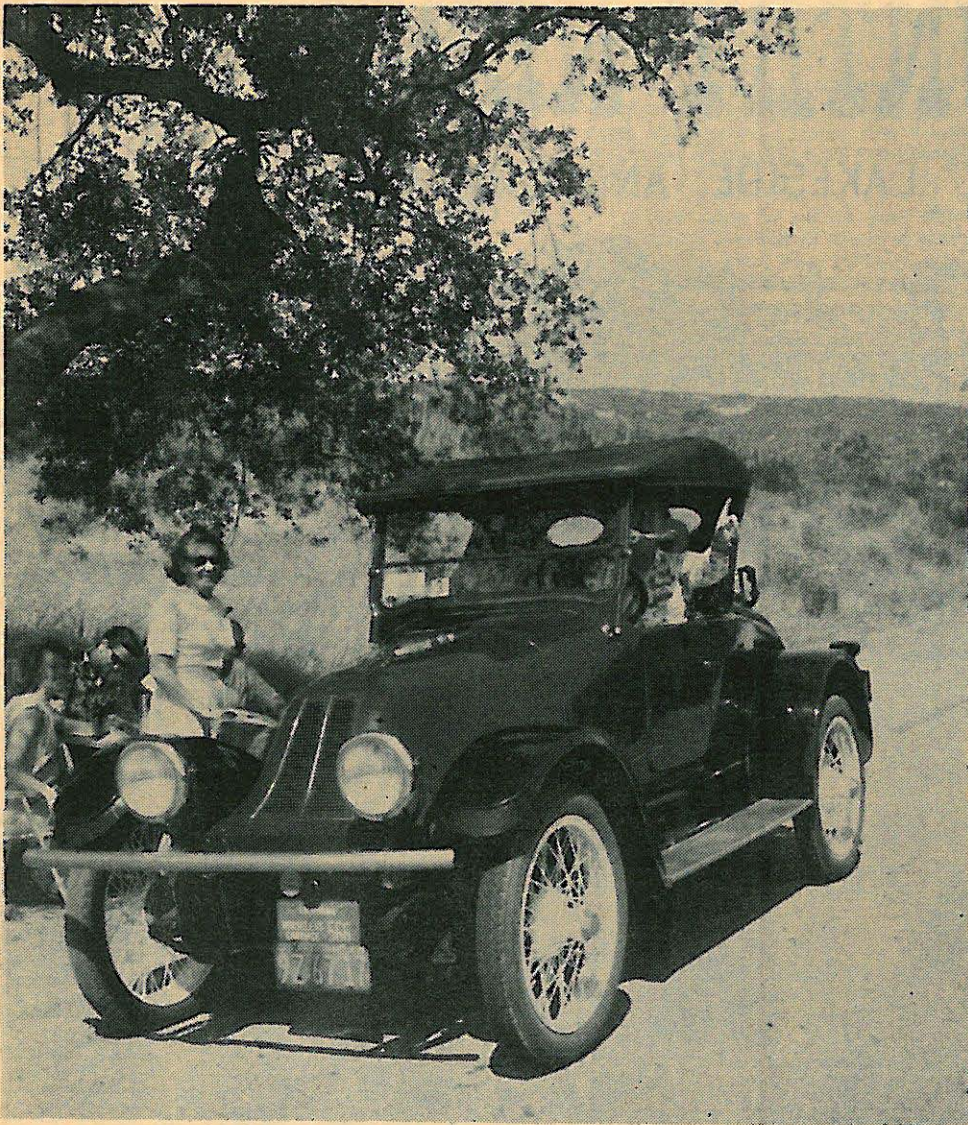

MY CALENDAR OF coming events notes that National Dog Week will be celebrated September 18th through the 24th. 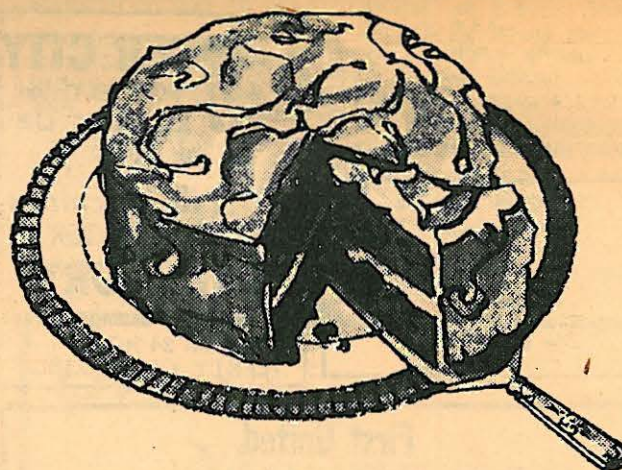
In a congratulatory letter from Herbert J. Simon, President of Van de Kamp's, winners were notified of their prized being delivered in California and Arizona communities.

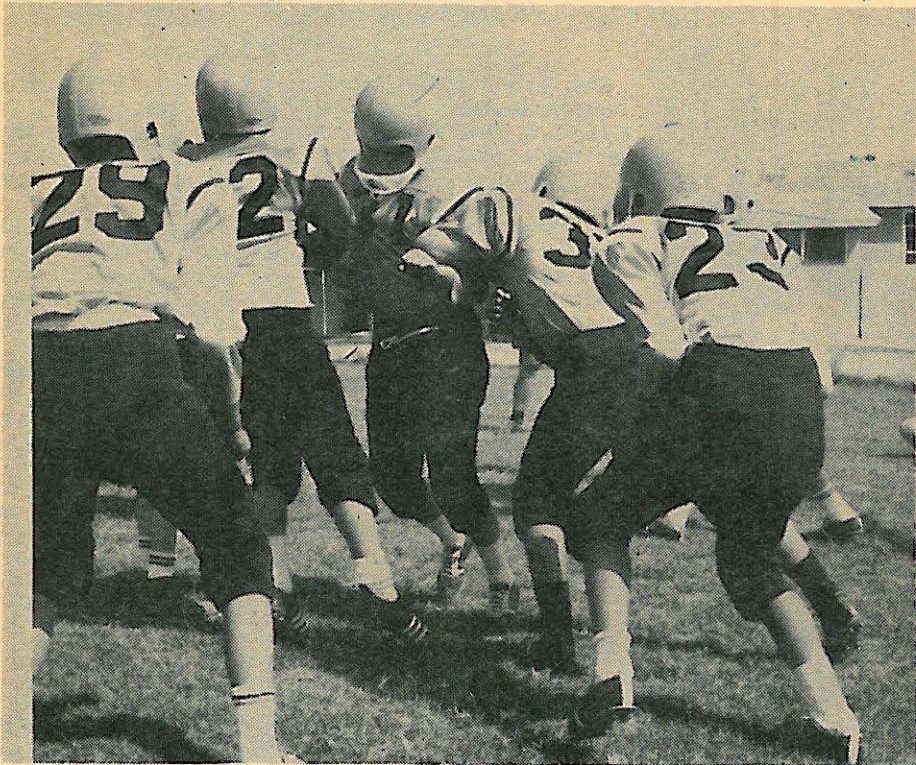

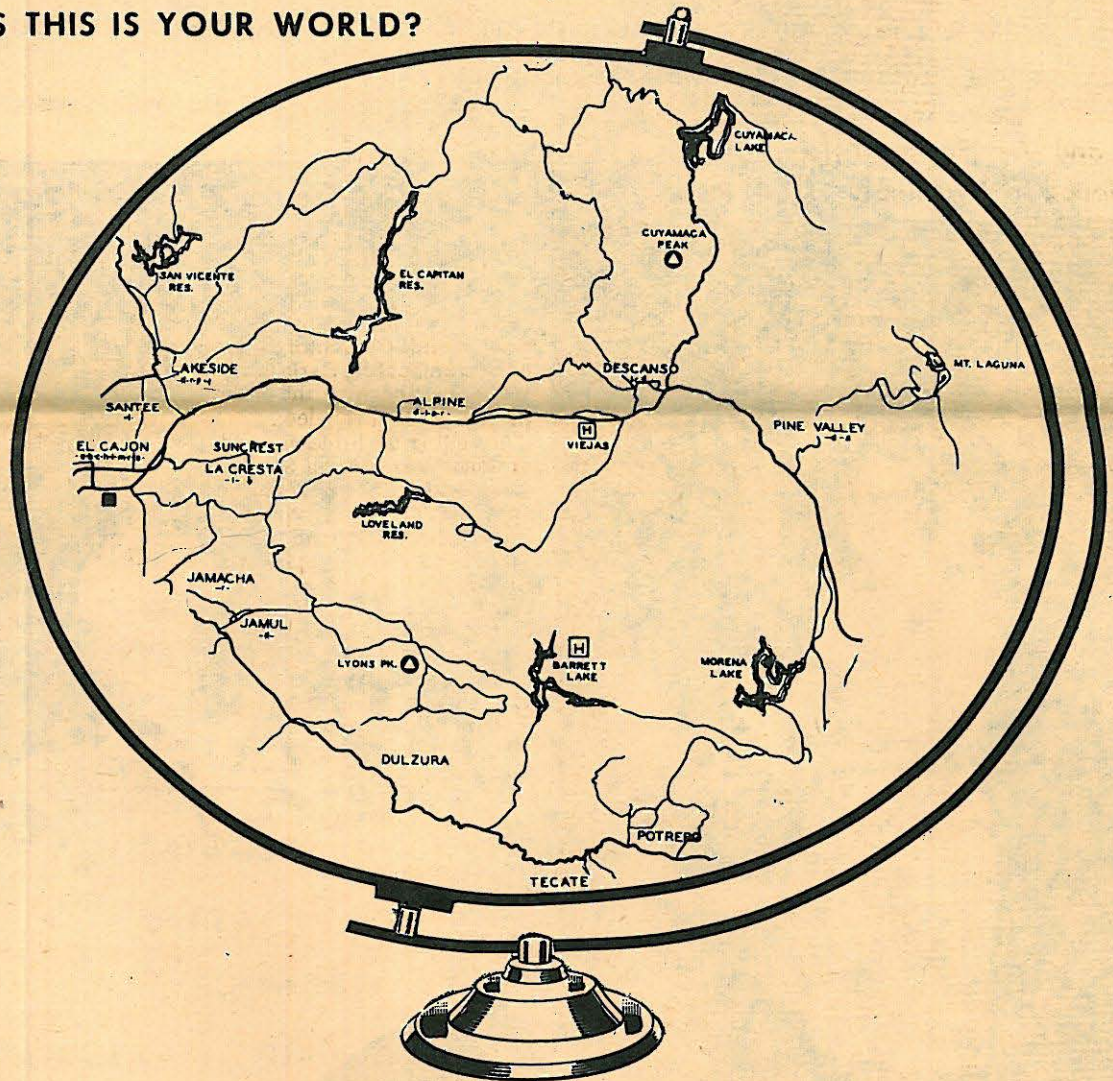

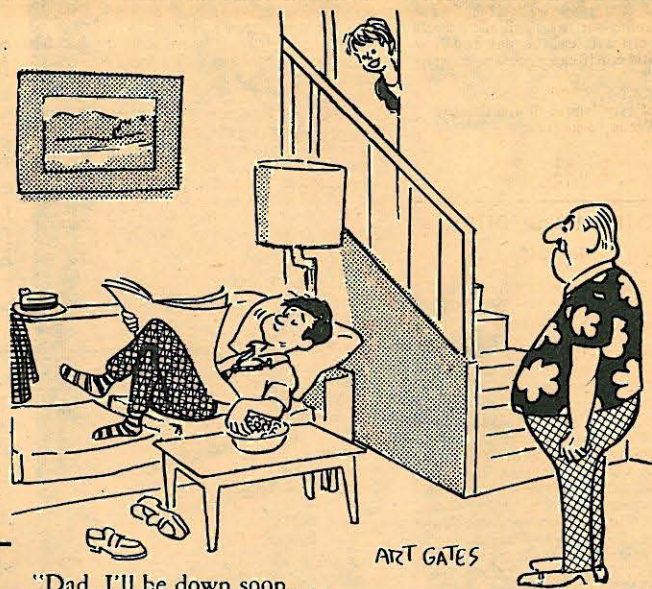
some of the problems of the youth, and particularly in getting to know the youth.

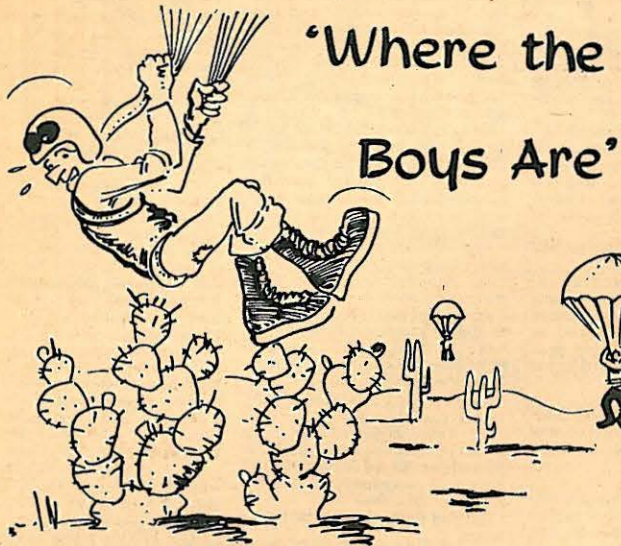
