

Show Complete Number

"Many Medicare claims are delayed because they are not properly submitted, " Arlyn B. Carr, District Manager for Social Security in San Diego, announced today.

The more common mistakes have been failure to show the complete Medicare account number, failure to have the claim form properly signed, and failure to attach receipts for all of the expenses claimed, Carr

Another common mistake that people make is to send in additional receipts with a note attached asking that they be associated with a prior claim which is still in process.

Each transaction must be processed as a separate unit, Carr said. This means that a new claim must be filled out if all of the expenses were not covered by the first claim.

We recently announced that we would help people complete the first set of papers, Carr said. When we do this, we prepare the claim form in duplicate. The original and all of the receipts go in for reimbursement. The claimant retains the copy and then is able to use it as a guide in making out future claims. If help is needed in preparing a second or third claim, we can provide that, too, Carr said.

The San Diego Social Security Office at 3211 5th Avenue is open to assist the public with any Social Security retirement, survivor, disability, or Medi-care claim, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and on Wednesday evenings until 7:30 p.m.



Many Still Waiting

Inspired by Pastor Ed Whitford of the Tecate Mission, and his wife Mary, who have four adopted children, we started a series last February, featuring children available for adoption. The Whitfords adopted children of minority races and children with physical defects. We felt that we wanted to do whatever we could to locate homes for children who needed the love and security of a home.

We have featured a child available for adoption through Adoption Services of San Diego County every other week for the past year. Twenty-six children have been featured during this time. Of these, the agency has placed eleven children. The following chart gives a resume of the children.

Our series has concentrated on children for whom homes are hard to locate. Thus the minority and the handicapped child has been featured more often. However, the agency has more boys than girls available for adoption and recently we have also featured some of the toddler boys who are waiting. Currently, Adoption Services of San Diego County has 57 Caucasian boys between nine months and five years while there are only nine girls in this age group. Some of these children have physical problems but most are healthy children.

All of these children are ready to bring happiness to a family. All need homes.

During the past year many families have applied for adoption as a result of our feature. Many placements have been made.

The Johnsons have two children, Mary 12 and Ellen 9. Unable to have other children because of Mrs. Johnson's health, they decided to adopt a boy. They applied in September and Raymond was placed in their home in December of last year. Mr. Johnson is in the Navy and Mrs. Johnson has been a housewife during her marriage. They enjoy horseback riding, bicycling and are active in several groups.

John, Ronald and Donald are the three sons of the Hollises. They enjoyed their sons very much and when their doctor recommended that Mrs. Hollis not become pregnant again, they turned to adoption for the daughter they always wanted. Brenda joined the family in January about four months after the Hollises applied for her. Mr. Hollis works for the City of El Cajon Park Department while Mrs. Hollis operates her own beauty shop. They enjoy bowling, camping and water skiing,

Mr. and Mrs. Bowers were childless when they applied for adoption. He works as a machinist for Convair. Mrs. Bowers worked as a receptionist-clerk before Andrew was placed with them but now devotes full time to being a mother.

The three families are very happy with their adopted children. They recommend the process to everyone who loves children and has room in their hearts for one more.



"Common sense is a mental set which enables us to lay out the facts and perceive the relations, at the same time keeping our prejudices and biases, propaganda, and other evil spirits which befuddle the mind. What insight is in regard to one's personal relations, common sense is with regard to sizing up nonpersonal relations. Common sense is thus more fundamental than intelligence. "- A. A. Roback. lined paper.

Dr. Roback's 350-page book "The Psychology of Common Sense" should be a must on the reading list of every psychologist and certainly should be studied carefully by those in the academic world that are engaged in training our youth.

On our criteria for vocations, salesmen, and executives, we have an indicator called "common sense" which is scored from zero to ten and is one of the five. in the Intellect Syndrome. It is interesting to find someone with a very high intellect that lacks this one quality called "common sense.

The graphologist has many things to look for in a person's writing to evaluate the common sense that the writer possesses: in today's specimen by N.J.F. (F-30-R) there are many such indicators.

The clear-cut way all of the strokes are made showing a fine control of nerves and muscles, plus a subconscious desire to keep things in focus and clearcut, are part of the factors that we look for.

Additional things are the ingenious and original formations of many of the letters, allowing the writer to accomplish her task of writing with a great deal more ease and speed than would otherwise be possible.

Although there is some day-

dreaming indicated by the high crossing of the "t" in "that, " it is counteracted by the very good control of the baseline throughout the script and the excellent spacing between the words. The spacing between lines is very consistent throughout the script, the writer maintaining equal distance between lines, at the top of the page, the center of the page, and the bottom of the page, this in spite of the fact that the writing was done on un-



W-2 FORMS NEEDED

A missing W-2 form was a major reason why thousands of taxyapers were late in getting Federal Tax refunds last year. This form is the statement employers are required to give their employees showing salaries and the taxes withheld during the

Ralph D. Short, Acting District Director for Southern California, said a return cannot be processed unless required W-2 forms are attached. "A missing W-2 will hold up a refund just as a missing signature or Social Security number will," he said.

Copy B of form W-2 is the one to be filed with Federal Tax return. The other copies are for the taxpayer's records and for the state and local purposes if so required.

Taxpavers who held more than one job last year should be sure to enclose a W-2 for each job Mr. Short said. On joint returns, W-2 forms for both husband and wife should be attached.

If a W-2 form is lost, employers will be able to provide duplicate copies in most cases, Mr. Short said. If a taxpayer is unable to obtain a W-2 from an employer the IRA should be notified.

Employers are required to give their employees W-2 forms by the end of January.
