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Stull Seeks Reason

Assemblyman John Stull (R-Leucadia) sent a telegram to the University of California Board of Regents, Chairman Theodore R. Meyer, today asking for an explanation of the purchase of 130 acres of prime land in the scenic La Jolla Farms area, north of La Jolla.

Stull was referring to a news-release that stated that the purchase price, of some of the most scenic land on the Southern California coast, was in excess of two million dollars.

"This money was not in the budget, "Stull said, "so I can only assume it was purchased by Regents Funds,"

"If the Regents have this kind of money, why is it we have been subjected to all the emotional talk of limiting enrollments, losing professors and not being able to live on proposed budget reductions," the Assemblyman asked.

FACILITIES TO EXPAND

Assemblyman George N. Zenovich (D-Fresno) and Senator Clair Burgener (R-San Diego) have introduced legislation to expand California's Regional Centers for the mentally retarded by three additional centers to make a total of five centers statewide.

Zenovich, the Assembly's Majority Leader, and Burgener, Chairman of the Santee Social

Welfare Committee, declared that "the two existing regional centers. located in San Francisco and Los Angeles, have proved conclusively that many retarded children who previously would have had to go to large state institutions can now be helped more effectively and at less expense by making maximum use of public and private community services."

Ruth Ochsner, formerly of El Cajon and Lakeside, has completed a five-month specialized course in Bible instruction and missionary training at the Watchtower Bible School of Gilead in New York City. 





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and pastored in the Michigan Conference before going to Afri-

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
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SCHOLARSHIPS
