Errors Make Difference

Simple errors on Federal income tax returns delay refunds and cause taxpayers trouble. Internal Revenue Service sug-

gests this simple checklist:

1. Check arithmetic and make sure information is on the correct line.

2. Attach Forms W-2 from all employers.

3. Sign your return. Both husband and wife must sign a joint return.

4. Print or type name and address, including zip code.
5. Use correct tax table.

6. Total your deductions if you itemize them on page 2.

7. List your Social Security number correctly. Both husband's and wife's number should be reported on the joint return.

You can save the Internal Revenue Service and yourself valuable time and money be carefully checking your 1966 tax return before you mail it.

Double Sessions Loom

Time is running out for the Grossmont District in its battle against burgeoning student enrollments.

But that's nothing really new for a district that was forced to build a school a year from 1957-1963 in order to keep abreast of mounting enrollments — all done with limited state and local funds.

Today, three of those six high schools constructed from '57-'63 face significant enrollment increases for next year, but critical enrollment needs by '68-'69, Granite Hills will go from a current 1,532 student body to 1,861 in '68-'69; Monte Vista, from 1,809 students this year to 2,040 in '68-'69; and Mount Miguel, from 2,188 students now to 2,652 in '68-'69.

Are there any other solutions to this problem other than to build on to existing facilities? District officials say no, generally, based on the steady yearly increase of students; however, the obvious solution would be double sessions at Mount Miguel, Monte Vista, and Granite Hills.

Students now at Grossmont and Helix could be transferred to Santana and El Capitan, if transportation were to be provided. While there are some available rooms at El Capitan, these will be needed before too long by that school as its enrollment increases.

In addition, becuase of its demanding program in building schools, the district has delayed maintenance projects to the point where further delay would demand either complete replacement or remedial action of the most expensive kind.

There seems to be no sensible solution, therefore, except to push for passage of a \$2 million school bond election on April 18. Funds released through such an action by voters will be used to provide facilities for an increasing student population, to finish uncompleted maintenance and construction projects, and to update substandard facilities in order to continue the quality educational program to which the district is committed at a cost below the state average.

If voters approve the bond appeal, it will be at least one year, the fall of 1968, before

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

Exhibitor Enters Fair

DEL MAR - Stamp collector Scerna C Lafler, 125 West Palm Ave., El Cajon, could never be called a slow-pokecertainly not by the entry department staff at the San Diego County Fair.

Lafler's entry in the 1967 County Fair's philatelic show is not only the first fair entry received this year, but one of the earliest over received.

And it is the first of about 31,000 entries the County Fair expects to receive between now and June 1, closing date for most entries. The County Fair will run a record 12 days, June 23-July 4.

County Fair officials recently mailed out premium lists for three specialty shows - photography, coins and stamps. Late this month they will mail hobby show, junior and senior department and art show premium lists, according to William Turnquist, entry supervisor.

Winner of the stamp show's grand award in 1966, Lafler will enter a unique and exceptional exhibit of American Eagle stamps dating back to 1798.

Lafler's collection of "eagle' stamps includes an embossed revenue tax stamp dated Aug. 10, 1798, issued only 39 days after the federal government tax stamp act became effective.

He will also display federa revenue stamps and revenue stamp paper, by which citizens or businesses were taxed for loan transactions, bank drafts, stock sales, imports, and retail sales of tobacco, snuff, "rectified" liquor, firearms and other items.

Some of the revenue stamps were issued to help finance the Civil War and Spanish-Ameri-

One particularly appropriate set of stamps the retired Army officer will display are the Sanitary Fair Stamps, issued during the Civil War to raise money for soldiers. They were sold at county or community fairs.

Lafler's eagle collection which won first prize in the topical division last year will be much larger this year, he says.

He will display 96 pages of revenue and postal stamps, all bearing the American eagle in eight frames.

His grand award in 1965 was for an exhibit of U.S. two-cent 'reds" of 1912, but rules prohibit exhibiting a grand awardwinning display a second time.

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Proclamation Received

The San Diego County Board of Supervisors named May 13th as Boy Scout Fair Day in a proclamation presented at last Tuesday's board meeting.

Six county Eage Scouts received the proclamation on behalf of all area scouts and gave each supervisor two complimentary tickets to the one-day annual scout fair to be held at the Del Mar Fairground.

David E. Chapman of Troop 311 in La Mesa accepted the proclamation from Supervisor Henry A. Boney, who is also immediate past president of the San Diego County Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

Boney commended the county's 29,000 scouts for their activities and said the local program "builds character, citizenship and physical fitness in our youth,"

Scouts attending the meeting included Kweon Spanbaugh, Troop 304, San Diego; James. R. Lemmon Jr., Troop 320, La Mesa; John F. Loukes, Troop 324, La Mesa; Michael Kirk, Troop 313, Lakeside; and, Patrick Smith, Troop 385, Santee.

The 18th annual scout fair is expected to draw more than 50,000 San Diegans to its oneday "The Wonderful World of Scouting," Scout displays, demonstrations and special audience participation activities will be staged on the fairgrounds midway.

"Purpose of the Scout Fair is to show scouting to the public and to provide units with a money raising opportunity," Max Elliott, Grossmont district scout executive, said.

Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts have been conducting a door-to-door campaign throughout the county to sell tickets to the special event.

Support Given

An endorsement and support for the Grossmont Junior College Districts proposed tax override of 50¢ per \$100 assessed valuation of real property has been given by the La Mesa Exchange Club and the Grossmont Union High School District Teachers Association.

The tax override, which needs a simple majority to pass, will enable Grossmont College to meet the increasing educational needs of the community. Should this important measure fail, the college will be unable to accomodate the normal, anticipated increase of students because of necessary reduction in courses to meet budget limitations.

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AMBULANCE, RESCUE UNIT STAND EXPLAINED

Because of the apparent confusion and lack of understanding concerning the Board of Fire Commissioner's attitude toward a rescue unit or ambulance for Alpine, we are quoting their report in its entirety. We wish Alpine to be completely informed and find that it can be done best in the words of the Alpine Fire Protection District, Board of Fire Commissioners,

Frank Scully resubmitted his proposal that the Alpine Fire District accept an ambulance or rescue type vehicle from the Civil Defense and authorize the organization of an ambulance or rescue service for the community of Alpine. Mr. Scully's oral proposal was not clear in that he referred to the type of vehicle and type of service as both rescue and ambulance

function, at different times.

"Also, letters received by the Board from organizations contacted by Mr. Scully urged the organization of an ambulance service and others a rescue service. In the case of the operation of an ambulance service the Board is of the opinion, the request made to it, involves much more than acquiring a vehicle and operators. The Fire District operates under the California State Health and Safety Code and is chartered to furnish the district protection from fire and nothing more, therefore, before taking any action on Mr. Scully's proposal, a legal opinion will be rendered the District Board by the County Counsel,

"In requesting this opinion the Board will especially ask for information as to the responsibility and liability to the District which the Board would be assuming if it instigated the ambulance service. When the County Counsel's opinion is received

a more detailed report will be given.

"Also present at the Board meeting were representatives of two privately owned ambulance services, one of whom stated he is part owner of the ambulance service operating in Ramona. This individual indicated a similar service could be had in the Alpine area for a very nominal fee of approximately \$15 per household. It might be worthwhile to further explore that possibility, which if established, would eliminate the possible liability to the District."

It has been further learned by this newspaper, that reportedly after a year use of this vehicle by the community, it could be turned over to an individual, or a group, free of charge, to be used at their descretion.

Further details will be revealed concerning this matter as they become available.


This was a rather quiet week to bee stings and must be taken to a hospital as quickly as possible.

The ceremony was performed


by Virgil Cox of the Life Science Church by an alter in the parlor flanked by two beautiful baskets of white flowers.

Gallop Gossip

On F.b. 28, we visited Lou and Shirley Lewellen of the Hill-dale Ranch, at 13730 U.S. Hwy. 80, El Cajon, located in the Johnstown area. The ranch has 17 acres, 14 stalls, 10 corrals, a tack room, a 60' breaking and exercise fling, and 135' x 250' arena. There are usually 25 to 30 horses, and right now 26; 15 are boarders, seven are in training and four are owned by the Lewellen's. Besides boarding and training (in all phases), Shirley teaches Stock Seat, Saddle Seat and Hunt Seat.

Some of their students that have been very successful at horse shows are their two daughters, Lou Ann and Lonnie, Lynn Romero and Robert Schwanhausser.

Lonnie is only eight years old and has been showing in the Walk-Jog Horsemanship classes, riding Dusty. Although she has shown for only a year Lonnie has eight trophies to her credit and she has proven to be nearly unbeatable in these classes.

Lou Ann is nine and has been showing since she was five. She started riding Lu Lu (35 years old), but has been using Dusty for the last two years. She's won about 25 trophies in Horsemanship and Western Pleasure classes. In 1965 she was the 12 & Under, Reserve Western Champion of the San Diego County Reserve Western Champion of the San Diego County Junior Horsemen's Assn. and in 1966 she was the Champion.

Lynn Romero is 14 and has only been showing for two years. She started on Dusty and about a year ago bought Morris Banjo, a bay quarter horse gelding (she still rides Dusty in Bareback Horsemanship). Lynn has won about 56 trophies in Horsemanship and Western Pleasure. She also has six High Point trophies and one Reserve. In 1966 she was 13 thru 17 Western Champion of the San Diego County Junior Horsemen's Assn.; Reserve in Bareback Horsemanship of the California Professional Horsemen's Assn.; and Morris Banjo was Open High Point horse of the Horsemen Executive Council shows, put on by the San Diego

County Junior Horsemen's Assn.

Lynn bought Dusty, a palomino gelding, four years ago when he was 15. At that time he was used only as a trail horse. About two years later, Lynn and Shirley Lewellen started training him for the shows. It took a lot of hard work but Dusty has carried all his riders to successful wins.

Robert Schwanhausser is 10. He started riding at seven and showing when he was eight. His horse is Marguerita, a walktrot saddlebred. Robert has 10 trophies and has been San Diego County Junior Horsemen's Assn. Reserve English Champion for two consecutive years.

Sandy Boyas is 15 and has recently started showing her horse, Tar Baby. She has been to five shows and placed in all of them with one first.

Paula Ertle is six and she rides Lu Lu in the Walk-Jog classes.

She has been to four shows and has placed well each time.

Delilah Neumann is 10 and she recently bought a 5-yearold quarter horse gelding, Quick Santee, which is in training. She plans to start showing in about two months.


Goldie's Blue Eagle is a gray appaloosa gelding, five years old. He is by Mr. Blue, a co-champion working appaloosa horse and out of Goldie, a thoroughbred type mare. Blue Eagle has placed high at halter and has two Reserve Championships. He has also won several Western Pleasure classes. He is owned by Miss Jessie Paxton of San Ysidro.

There is only one stallion standing at Hilldale — Gregg's Pancho Villa, a handsome 6-year-old appaloosa, owned by Ken Johnson of Ocotillo, Pancho Villa is by Paisano's Frost and out of Bonnie B. Both are of foundation stock. He also has Lucky Blanton, a quarter horse, on his sire's side. Pancho is a beautiful colored dun with black mane, tail and legs; and white markings on his hindquarters. He was High Point Halter Champion as a 2-year-old of the Cal Zona Appaloosa Club and was undefeated in Hackamore classes in 1964. One hundred per cent of his foals have been colored appaloosas.

One of Pancho Villa colts is also at Hilldale Ranch — Bar Cee Bandio — a 2-year-old, owned by Diane McComb of Point Loma. He is a chestnut but has the same markings as his sire and is a beautiful appaloosa. His dam is by Bar Cee Bar, a quarter horse, that ran AA+ at the tracks and a grandson of the thoroughbred Three Bars. Bandito was High Point Halter yearling of the Cal Border Appaloosa Club last year. (Accompanying picture is Bandido shown by Lou Lewellen winning his halter class at Poway in Sept. 1966.)

Another of Pancho's foals in training at Hilldale, is a nice looking 2-year-old gelding out of a thoroughbred mare. He is the same dun shade as his sire and is very colorfully marked. His name is Sca-Villa and he is owned by Leslie Esmay of La Cresta.

We enjoyed our visit with Lou and Shirley. Visitors are always welcome at Hilldale Ranch. Their telephone number is 443-1516. Don't forget the Appaloosa show at this ranch on April 2nd.

Seek Credentials

"If someone comes to your door and says he is from the social security or medicare office ask to see his credentials. " Social Security District Manager, Arlyn B. Carr, advised senior citizens in the San Diego area today.

Carrsaid that there have been scattered instances around the country in which confidence men have used medicare as a pretense for getting money from social security and medicare beneficiaries. There have been occasional reports of such incidents in San Diego, Carr said.

Any bonafide social security representative will readily show his identification and will not mind at all if you want to double check by calling the social security office on the telephone.

It is a federal offense. Carr pointed out, to impersonate a government employee and punishable by imprisonment.

"Ask for identification if someone comes to your house and says he is a social security representative," Carr emphasized. "If you have reason to doubt his identity, call the social security office to see if they sent him out to see you. And remember, no social security employee will ask you to give him money to have something done.


