The San Diego Department of Public Health and San Diego County Medical Society yesterday announced that a final, corrected total of 31,376 San Diego County youngsters from one through nine years of age were vaccinated against measles during the End Measles in San Diego County program.

The program was sponsored

by the Medical Society and De-partment of Public Health in cooperation with other official and voluntary agencies.

Dr. Lawrence E. Reck, Medical Society End Measles chairman, said, "The effectiveness of this program should mean a dramatic reduction in the number of children in San Diego County who have measles and measles complications. In addition to the 31,376 children immunized in the End Measles program a substantial number have been immunized by their private physicians in the three vears that measles vaccine has been available."

A veteran of the Korean conflict, John is now a Naval Reserve Lieutenant.


Since purchasing their "ranch" off West Victoria Dr., the Brookes family has been active in civil affairs, particularly scouting.

ARCHER DEFENDS U.S. POLICY

Roy "Pat" Archer, recent candidate for the 80th Assembly District, defended U.S. involvement in Vietnam at a conference of the California Democratice Council Clubs of Orange County and the 80th Assembly District. The Conference served as an information guide for delegates to the CDC state convention scheduled for Fresno, March 10, 11 and 12. Archer disagrees with those in CDC who oppose the bombing of North Vietnam.

"Our bombing of the industrial and military sites of North Vietnam is intended to bring the Communists to the negotiation tables. They will not negotiate if they feel we want to get out of the war. We must negotiate from a position of strength," said Archer.

The war in Vietnam should

be seen as one more step in a long series of events which began in Iran, Turkey and Greece after WWI; which caused the Berlin blockade; which led to the Korean War and the Malayan emergency, "continued Ar-cher. "If we retreat in Vietnam the Chinese Communist will have proof that their approach to 'Wars of Liberation' is correct. By appeasing the Communists we would only encourage them to be more aggressive.

"At its convention in Fresno the CDC, which in the past has been the only effective Democratic grass-roots organization in California, must face the realities of the world conflict. CDC must remember that its primary goal is to elect Demo-crats, "concluded Archer.

He comes of a varied background of experience.


