Chairman for the dance is Mrs. E. Clark Hatch with Mrs. Jerry Hollingsworth co-chairman.



Wild Flower of the Week

AFRICANDAISY - arctotis -(ahrk toh' tis) Not a native but so well-naturalized that it seems like one. Annual; self-sows readily; has a long blooming season. Plants six inches or more tall; toothed leaves; flowers light yellow to orangebrown. As a cut flower lasts a week; flowers close at night. It grows in most any soil and is good for mass planting. Splashes of vivid color in yards now probably are arctotis. Variety grandis has ray petals white on upper side and lilac-blue beneath with a steel-blue center. This variety is seldom seen here but is worthy of more common planting.


