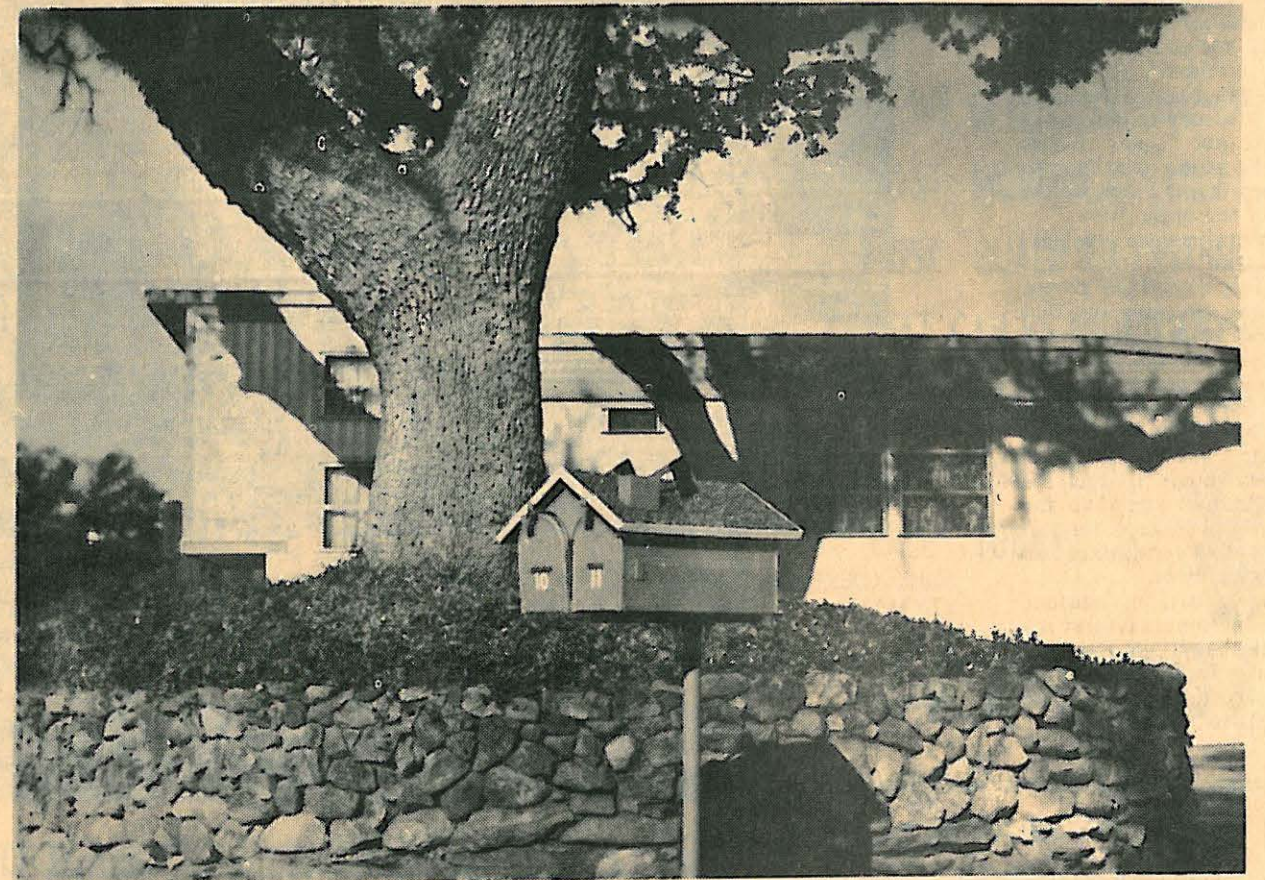

Heritage Housing Group Meets

The proposed board of the Heritage Housing Project met at Mrs. John Titus' home Monday evening.

Attending were people from other areas as well as Mrs. Anna Jerney, realtor involved in the sale of the property, and Mrs. H. A. Spear, owner of the property on which the "Heritage Homes" are allegedly to be built. This was the first meeting of the group which was open to the press.

A discussion concerning the "open" meetings in the future was held with Dr. Bob Bingham the apparent originator of various plans of this sort who is of the opinion that the meetings should be open to the public and Carl Gregory, promoter, disagreeing. Dr. Bingham will consult with his attorney to determine whether or not "open" meetings will be held. Mr. Gregory maintained it was "none of the business of the press."

Roy Burnett, county supervisor of the Farmer's Home Administration, explained to Dr. Bingham and the gathering, that as yet, no actual application has been made on the local level for the Alpine project.

Several facts were brought out by Mr. Burnett on how to go about filing and applying for government funds to buy the land, build and furnish the apartments (except for soft goods and other furnishings) for this type of project.

Roy Burnett still maintained that the government is most interested in the will of the people in this matter. A meeting will be planned where Alpine can express its wishes.

WILD FLOWER

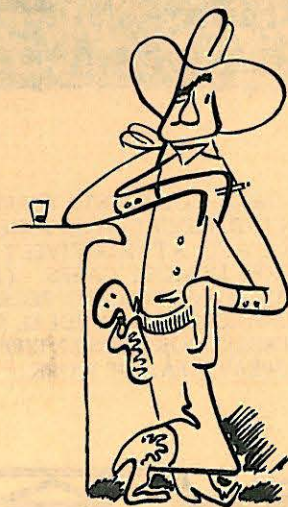
SMALL LUPIN (lew' pin) — Among the daintiest of wild flowers are these with their leaves divided into seven ray-like segments from 1/2 to 1/4 inch wide and 3/4 inch long; plants are from 6 inches to 1 foot tall; the smaller has bright green leaves and the wider-rayed dark green leaves; flowers pea-shaped in spike about one to two inches long; one in bloom now, other has buds; prefers rather dry sandy soil. The nodules on the roots tell that it belongs to the legume family and is busy taking nitrogen from the air for its own use and to store for later plants. Its airy foliage is sometimes used for greenery in flower arrangements.

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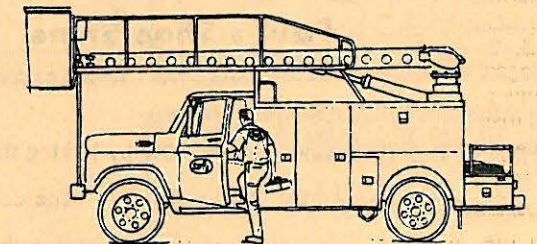

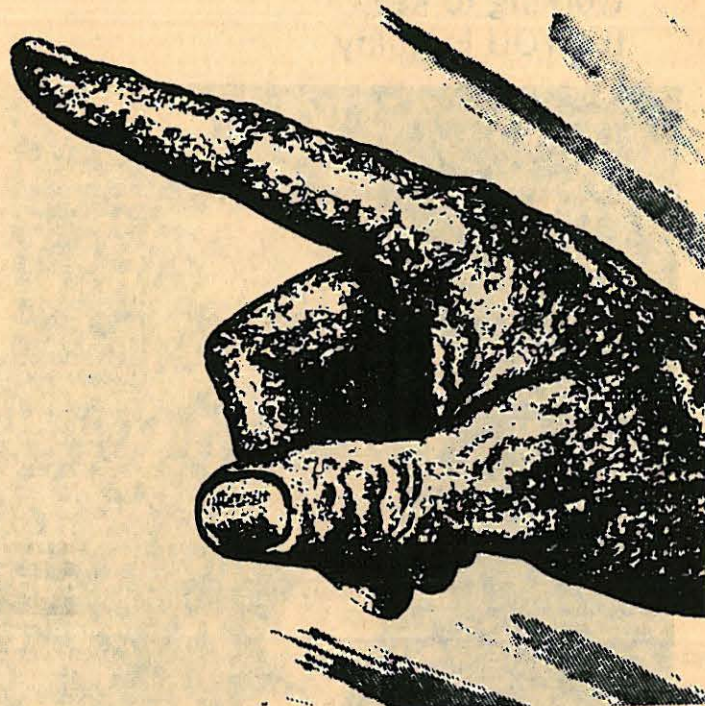

Fire Commissioner Report

The following items were discussed and acted upon at the last regular meeting of the Alpine Fire Commissioners meeting:

A proposed budget for the ensuing fiscal year was submitted in the amount of \$30, '38 which will be studied before adoption.

Rio San Diego Municipal Water District bill for \$3,072.94 for installation of fire hydrants was approved. This leaves only No. 25 and 26 to be installed during this fiscal year. They are expected to be completed during May.

On recommendation by Fire Chief Malcolm Huey, the commissioners voted unanimously to drop the following persons from the roster of the Volunteer Firemen: Robert Evers, William Noonan and William Kelley.

District Fire Marshall LeRoy Wedel submitted a letter received outlining the Highway's contract in using all practical precautions regarding burning permits in which the state will be the issuing agency with the Federal Forestry Service, the State Forest Ranger and the Local Fire Protection District cooperating during the construction of the freeway through Alpine to the U.S. Forestry Guard Station.

The letter said in part, a fire Safety Officer will be on the job at all times; a water wagon with 500 gallon capacity and 200 feet of hose and a pump capable of delivering a minimum of 50 pounds nozzle pressure will also be on hand.

In view of the foregoing precaution, residents of the community should not be alarmed if they see brush being burned on the freeway project.

Children to Show Art

All Lakeside schools, from the primary department through junior high school, will participate in the Children's Art Show to be held at the Choir Room for the Lakeside Family Fair, May 6 and 7.

Due to limited space, the adult show and the invitational show will not be held this year.

Shirley Higginson, Ruth Beaton and Sally Miller are in charge of the children's show which promises to be outstanding.

A special use permit for a trailer park has been granted at the old Dinosaur Park on Hwy. 80. One hundred and forty three spaces are planned. Children and pets will be welcome but will have their facilities in separate sections.

The Rev. Tom Major, a missionary to India, has worked for 20 years at the Kothara Leprosy hospital and home in that country. During that time his work has included a variety of duties.

Major will tell of some of the many things that he does at Kothara when he speaks at Mapleview Baptist Church, Lakeside, on May 7th, Sunday, at 11:00 a.m.

For several years Major has served as administrative superintendent of the hospital and home. One of his duties was supervising the building and remodeling of buildings on the hospital grounds.

During his time as superintendent, the hospital purchased and developed 80 acres of land into a prosperous agricultural resource. Profits from the farm are used to help with the expenses of the hospital. These funds also support evangelistic ministries in the vicinity of the hospital.

The leprosy hospital treats many hundreds of patients. Intricate surgery to help patients regain use of their arms and legs is performed by a national surgeon at the hospital. This young doctor was encouraged through his medical training by Major.

Major is a graduate of the Bible Institute of Los Angeles, La Mirada, California, and of Eastern Baptist Theological seminary, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He serves with the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission society of Wheaton, Illinois.

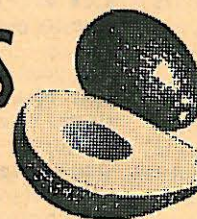

The Sheriff's Department will be on hand to lock up each evening thus giving Alpine much better service from the Post Offices boxes.

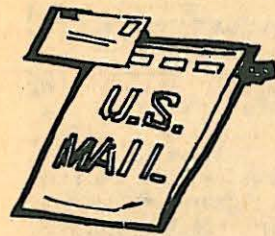

As we unhitch to head for the barn for this week we leave you with this piece of friendly advice. Never try to tie your shoe strings in a revolving door.

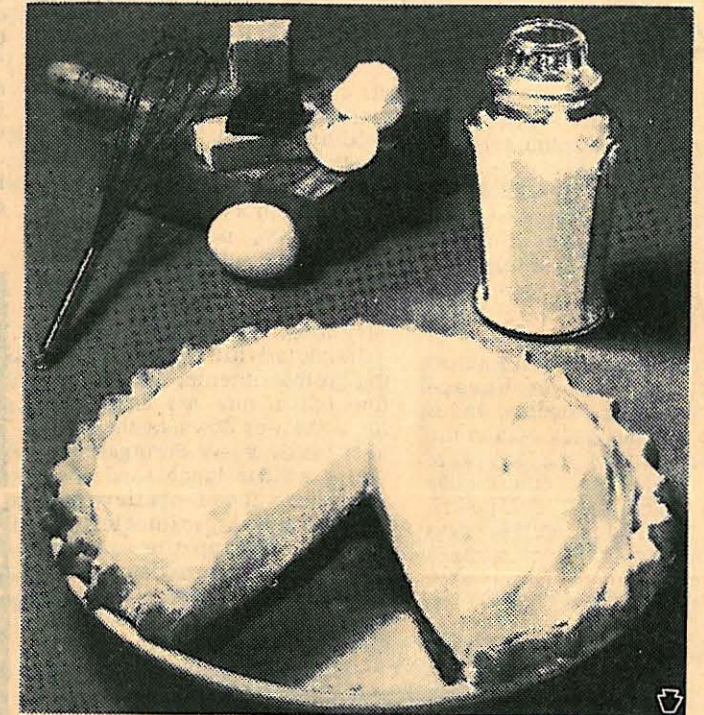

Black Bottom Pie Outstanding

One of the most elegant desserts you can serve is Black Bottom Pie which consists of a chocolate-flavored bottom layer, topped with a rum-flavored custard layer. The distinctive results are worth extra effort, as it's delicate flavor and texture are sure to reap compliments as you serve it on very special occasions.

Black Bottom Pie

1 baked 9-inch pastry shell	1/4 cup light rum or orange juice
1 envelope unflavored gelatin	1/3 cup light corn syrup
1/4 cup cold water	1 1/2 ounces unsweetened chocolate, melted
1 cup sugar	1 teaspoon vanilla
3 tablespoons corn starch	1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon salt	4 egg whites
2 cups milk	1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
4 egg yolks, slightly beaten	

Sprinkle gelatin over cold water; let soften. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, corn starch and salt in double boiler top. Gradually add milk, stirring until smooth. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until thickened. Cover; cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, prepare pastry. Stir a little hot mixture over boiling water. Cook 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from boiling water. Measure 3/4 cup mixture into large bowl. Blend in softened gelatin, stirring until gelatin is completely dissolved. Mix in rum. Stir corn syrup into remaining custard, then blend in chocolate and vanilla. Pour chocolate custard into pastry shell. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until soft peaks form when beater is raised. Gradually add remaining 1/2 cup sugar, beating until stiff peaks form. Fold into rum custard. Pour on top of chocolate custard in pastry shell. Chill.

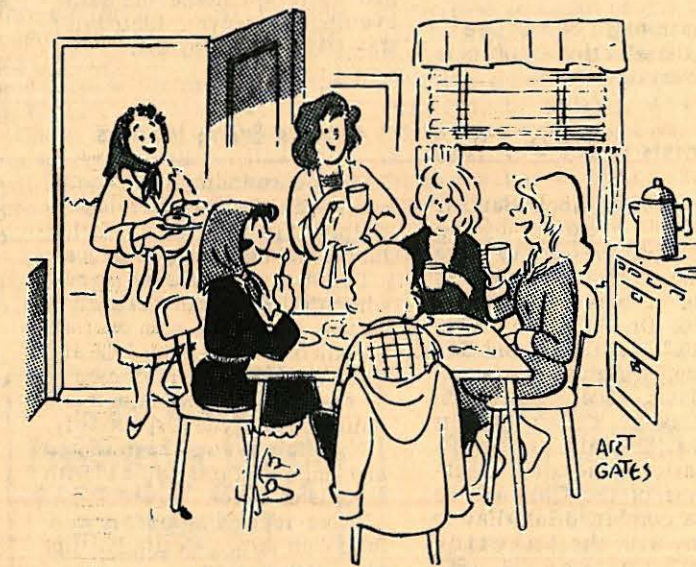

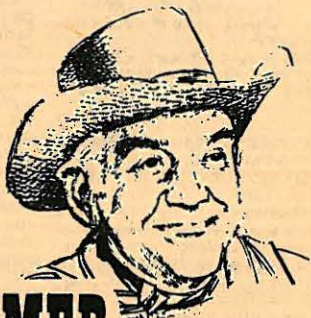

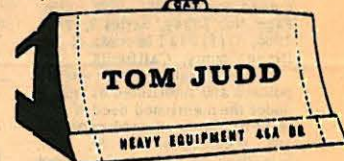

The Legislature, operating for the first year under a new constitutional amendment (Proposition 1-A) which permits an unlimited session, ran into the worst bill log-jam in recent history.

April 11 marked the final day for introduction of bills at this session, since we adopted a rule several weeks ago which provided no bills could be introduced after that date. This was aimed at an adjournment of the Legislature by the end of June. The only exception would be if a member could get a approval of two-thirds of his house for introduction of a bill.

This cut-off date was most necessary to stop the endless flow of thoughts and allow concentration on the measures before us. And it must be remembered that none of these bills may be heard for at least 30 days after their introduction.

While the session could last through the end of the year, under adoption by the people of Propositions 1-A last fall, it is obvious that it takes some time for a measure to make its way through the necessary committees and secure approval of both houses. The rule frees the legislative counsel - the legal arm of the Legislature - from the practical problem of having to draft bills that are not going to have time to make this arduous course.

Members of the Legislature introduced nearly 1,000 pieces of new legislation on April 11 to meet the deadline. In the lower house, Assemblymen introduced a total of 2,578 bills and 73 constitutional amendments for the entire 1967 session, while the Senate introduced a total of over 1,500 measures.

For comparison, during the 1965 session the Assembly introduced a total of 3,487 bills and 92 constitutional amendments, while the Senate introduced 1,531 measures.

Many legislators protect their districts before the cut-off date by the introduction of "spot bills" which make a technical change in the law in the general area of concern. This meets the de-

mands of the deadline rule, and the bill may later be amended to provide the exact language desired. Bills which have been killed or for some reason amended completely earlier in the session are resurrected as a vehicle for a measure entirely different from that originally intended.

There is one other deadline facing the Legislature. This requires us to have the bill out of the house of origin by a date yet to be established. The bill must have passed the halfway point at least by securing approval of the house in which it was introduced. Again, failure to approve a bill is not fatal to the measure because it is still possible to amend the language of a bill which has progressed to the second house.

It is still too early to assess all of these last-minute bills that have been introduced, because the log-jam has also affected the printing of the bills, and many were not available for perusal immediately.

Among those we do know about, however, are some important and possible controversial measures including a bill which extends the state's open housing law to practically every dwelling of the state. Another one would create a consumer advocate's office to represent the view of consumers before the Legislature and government agencies. Still another would authorize the department of public health to pilot study on cigarette "with-drawal centers."

Two other measures which may cause furors in the coming months are bills to prohibit public employees from striking or recognizing a picket line, and an increase in the local sales and use tax from one cent to two cents.
